The Chairman of *The Ringing World*, Jackie Roberts, will say a few words of welcome and introduce the prize-giving ceremony for the RW National Youth Contest.

Reclaiming VAT to end for bells, organs, pews and clocks

With effect from 4 January 2011 the following will become ineligible under the scheme (where VAT could be reclaimed) irrespective of when the works were undertaken:

- professional fees
- repairs to organs, pews, bells and clocks

The deadline for submitting claims for the above is 31 December 2010, although claims should be made earlier in case of delays. The changes to the Listed Places of Worship Grant Scheme are available on their website, LPWGscheme.org.uk. Any churches affected may wish to check the website regularly so as to be kept up to date.

More towers affiliate to the Association

The Association has had an increase in the number of towers that are subscribing. Also on the increase is the number of individual subscribers to Devon Calls. This enthusiasm in Devon Call Change Ringing has also been witnessed by the increase in the number of competitions that are being held in Devon over the last year.

Theft from Churches

Parishioners at churches have been left reeling after thieves have made off with metal objects. In one instance thieves stole a war memorial crucifix. Your metal has a scrap value and is attractive to thieves, whether it is lead on the roof, bells, some churches have bells as individual items standing on the floor or even a war memorial crucifix. Metal items can be marked with Smartwater and it is hoped that with the appropriate signage this can deter removal.

Obituary - Mervyn Phillips

Mervyn Phillips

17th June 1923- 18th August 2010

West Down Parish Church was packed to capacity and many standing outside on Sunday August 30th as family, ringers and friends from all over Devon gathered for the funeral of Mervyn. The large number showed the high esteem in which he was held. The service was conducted by The Revd Sarah Woods. Some of these words are taken from the tribute given to Mervyn by his nephew Nigel, son of his late brother Les.

"I am honoured to speak today about Uncle Merv. He himself asked me to do this three years ago but despite this advance warning it transpires that no time would have been sufficient to prepare some words to do ample justice to his full and rich life. Mervyn Wilfred Phillips was born, second son of three, to Brinley and Hilda Phillips on 17th June 1923. He was born in Church Hill House, which has been his home for all but a few years of his life. His christening in West Down church was marked with a peal on the six bells that were to become so important to him throughout his life. The ringers for this peal were rung by six brothers – six Hookways, all Mervyn's uncles and led by Uncle Bill (Ivor's father). His early years were spent forming his many practical skills on and around the family smallholding. Mervyn attended West Down Primary School and then on to Braunton. He never had a good record of punctuality. The reason given was that he had to finish delivering the milk throughout the village first!

At the age of 13 Merv continued in the family tradition of bellringing, a passion that remained with him for the next 74 years. He was very eager to learn together with his good friends Len Smale and Walter White. These were hard, but happy times spent in West Down, growing up with friends and cousins who are here today, Vera and Ivor. On leaving school at 14 Mervyn commenced his apprenticeship as a wheelwright with W. Issac and Sons in Braunton. Merv received his call up papers at the age of 18 although he was allowed to complete his five year apprenticeship before being conscripted into the Army. With a name like Phillips he was sent to the Welsh Guards. Merv was trained at the Welsh Guards Depot in Caterham in Surrey. He was with the 3rd Battalion of the Welsh Guards and went to Italy in March 1944 to fight in the Battle of Monte Cassino as part of the Allied Forces intention of breaking the Winter Line, driving the occupying forces northwards and liberating Rome. He was to spend the next year and a

half in Italy in atrocious battle and weather conditions. He spent his 21st birthday in a slit trench in Italy, was shot in the back of the neck by a sniper and became the then youngest sergeant in his Company, having taken charge from a frost bitten colleague. He was one of only 139 Welsh Guards to be mentioned in Despatches for distinguished service. Mervyn led his men to identify and silence two German posts that were picking off Allied servicemen and holding back the advance of the troops. The certificate and bronze oak leaf to commemorate this act of bravery were proudly displayed at his mother's home and, since her death in 1974, it has been at Church Hill House. He was always a modest man and never wanted to talk about his war years even to his family. Despite the hardships of War and Army life it was a time he said he "enjoyed" and his approach to life and people was very much shaped during this period. Mervyn was preparing for passage to the Far East when VJ Day was declared and he was to spend a further year in the Army before being discharged in September 1946. He returned home to West Down to work on the small holding. This work alone could not sustain a soon to be married man. So he began his long association with RAF Chivenor, spending two years using his carpentry skills repairing and refurbishing railway coaches for the Atlantic Coast Express. Merv was appointed Clerk of Works at Chivenor, a position he held for 25 years. On November 2nd 1946 he married Daphne, a local girl, at West Down church! Susan arrived just over a year later and Colin a few years later. Mervyn was never happier than when in West Down and he and Daphne were happily married for over 55 years until Daphne's death in 2002. Upon retirement from Chivenor he was a regular bearer for many years for Clarke's of Braunton.

Mervyn rejoined the bell ringing team ringing the 3rd. He was appointed Captain in May 1957 on the retirement of Mr. Fred White senior. Merv remained Captain and rang the treble bell until he was forced to give up ringing through ill health last year. The achievements and reputation of this team were immense. During a 19 year spell between 1957 and 1975 West Down were Devon Champions 11 times, runners up on 7 occasions and third once. They were the first tower to be Devon Champions for three years in succession. West Down also were Devon Champions in 1953, 1954 and 1986. In May 1954 West Down bell ringers were selected to ring a welcoming home peal live on the BBC radio as the Queen returned from her post Coronation Commonwealth tour. This was followed up with West Down bells

being broadcast on Radio 2's Christmas Morning Bells. At one Bell Ringers' Dance held at the Commodore Hotel in Instow a poem called the Ringers' Chorus was read with the subject of the first verse being Mervyn. "There's Mervyn Phillips, the treble man, Captain of this merry band, Full of nonsense you'll agree, and always ready for a spree!" In November 1985 I was delighted to spend the Saturday with Merv, Sue and the West Down bell ringers, and other teams from Devon where they were invited to take part in a Devon style competition – and they won it! He was a member of The Devon Association of Ringers, chairman of North Devon committee, and the last remaining founder trustee of the Devon Bell Restoration Fund. He was made President of the Association in 2001. This was the year of the foot and mouth outbreak and there were no ringing festivals. He was offered the Presidency for a second year but ever the traditionalist, declined to take this on, not wanting to set a precedent for a role that had always been a 12 month appointment.

One of Mervyn's proudest moments was when a photograph of him, daughter Sue, grand daughter Clare and great grandson Jake ringing together as four generations was displayed at The Millennium Dome in London in 2000. He was also one of The Devon Belles ladies ringing team greatest supporters, and it was only a couple of years ago that he treated us all to a "Squires fish and chip supper from Braunton". Mervyn became a Freemason in 1970. He joined the Braunton Lodge and was elected by the brethren to become Worshipful Master of the Lodge in 1982. Later Mervyn joined the Lyn Lodge where he was an active member. Merv was liked by all, loyal and respected, loved and interested in people. His motto could have been "treat others as you would like to be treated yourself". I would like to end with a poem from my father's funeral in this church, as these words are also so appropriate for Merv "Four things a man must learn to do if he would make his record true: To think without confusion clearly; To love his fellow-men sincerely; To act from honest motives purely; To trust in God and Heaven securely." Thank you.

A muffled peal before the service was rung by West Down Ringers. Mandy Nicholas, Tony Jeffrey, Nick Williams, Trevor Sellick, Tony Barrable, and George Rogers. After the service an open peal by ringers who Mervyn had picked, Margaret White, Hilary Trout, Cedric Hockin, Tom Welch, Dave Trout and Fred White. Muffled peals had also been rung, in memory, at Heanton, Marwood and West Down.

<p>Paul Bristow The sudden death of Paul was in the press and on television. Paul and his wife, Thea, were members of the congregation at St Marychurch and Thea used to ring at Torre. Father David Lashbrooke had requested half muffled bells at the funeral on Friday 9th July at 4-15pm. Des Smale (a member of the old West Down team also passed away in August. His funeral was held at West Down. Den Cockram the former captain of Witheridge, died and his funeral was held on 9 September 2010. Kenneth John Parish Funeral held at 12.00 on Friday 1 October at Chawleigh. Ken was born 13 January 1932 at New Inn Cottages, Chawleigh and went to Chawleigh Primary School and then to Chulmleigh Secondary School. He left school to work at the Bakery in Chawleigh and then as a Carpenter at Lapford until he retired. He married Nora in April 1954 at St James' Chawleigh and had 6 children, 9 grand children and 2 great grand children. He was Secretary of Chawleigh Friendly Society for over 15 years. He enjoyed gardening, growing his own vegetable, His favourite flowers were Sweet Peas. He enjoyed the countryside and hunting and listening to the stags. He spent time in his early days at Stone Mill Farm helping out with the harvest and looking after the animals and then later in life helped his son, Stephen, with lambing at that farm. He was involved in fundraising for charities, notably the Duck Races held at Stone Mill Farm. Ken played football for Chawleigh as well as darts at Kingsnympton and both of the pubs in Chawleigh. Ken was on TV in a competition on Westward Television some years ago and came 2nd. He was treasurer of Chulmleigh and District Skittles League for over 30 years. Ken was a bell ringer for over 50 years and for many years a ringer for the Chawleigh competition team and has been a loyal supporter of that tower ever since as well as keeping the surrounding towers supplied with ringers when their own teams stopped ringing. He was always positive and cheerful and gave 100% to everything he did but never made a fuss. He was always one of those people who just quietly got on with it and many people will feel his loss. William Hannaford-Hill, known as Billy, passed away Tuesday 5 October and his funeral was held on Saturday, 9 October at 2.30 at Stoke Gabriel Church. The bells were rung shortly before and after the service.</p>	<p>Andrew Nicholson has sent this press release. Burglary at the premises of Nicholson Engineering Ltd, Church Bell Works, St Swithin's Road, Bridport, DT6 5DW Some time between the close of business at 1715hrs on Monday 20th September and 0815hrs the following morning, a burglary occurred at the premises of Nicholson Engineering Ltd in Bridport, Dorset. As might be expected, the premises were subject to a high level of security. The burglary was highly professional and well organised and involved the theft of nine bells of varying sizes. We believe four of the bells were removed complete with the pallets on which they were sat prior to being stolen. All nine bells were without headstocks. In the event that anyone offers you any of the bells, I should be grateful if you would contact Dorset Police on 0856 456 7000. Although the insurance pay out will cover the financial cost, Tim Holmes, Campsea Ashe church bell project co-ordinator, said the theft was bitterly disappointing. "Four of ours have gone," he said. "Two of the older ones are still there which is a relief. However one of the oldest ones dates from 1729. The others are the three new ones that were cast this year. "It's because of the metal. The bells are made up of an alloy of copper and bronze. They all had steel headstocks but these were removed. Whoever has taken them knew what they wanted. "It's hugely disappointing. People in the village had done an awful lot of fundraising. It was a lot of hard work. Even people who had nothing to do with the church, they just wanted to see the bells restored and ringing again. One bell in particular - the Village Bell - that cost around £7,000. It was funded by donations from local people. That has gone. Two of the other bells were sponsored by individuals. One gentleman from outside the village who stayed here and another woman who dedicated the bell to the memory of her family. It's very upsetting." Many parishes are putting Smart Water on their roofs, so ought to do the same on any accessible bells? Historic bells, once smashed, are irreplaceable. European Metal Recycling Ltd has provided the following information in relation to church bells: ".....As you pointed out they are normally made of Copper and Tin, high grade Phosphor Bronze. They can be 78%Cu and 22% Tin, depending on how old they are. The older bells usually have a higher Tin content than newer ones; we would need samples to check. If they are genuine high grade Phosphor Bronze the returns would be substantial, in the region of £4500 per ton. I don't know how much a bell weighs but I would imagine a small one weighs at least 200Kg, so a bell of this size would be worth I suspect a minimum of £900".</p>	<p>Listed Places of Worship Grant has a website address check the latest information http://www.lpwscheme.org.uk/ With effect from 4 January 2011 the following will become ineligible under the scheme, irrespective of when the works were undertaken:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • professional fees • repairs to organs, pews, bells and clocks <p>The announcement relates to works on clocks, pews, bells, organs and <u>all</u> professional fee claims on projects where a professional advisor (e.g. architect, QS) is engaged. Although the deadline for submitting claims for these items is 31 December 2010, one Deanery Treasurer who has spoken to LPWG Scheme said that he was advised to get any claims in by 20th December because, with the Christmas break and delays in the post, it may well be that claims submitted at the last minute won't arrive by the cut off date. Currently the scheme remains unchanged for other eligible maintenance and building works. Check the LPWG Scheme website to keep up to dated. When going to press it had the following: *IMPORTANT NOTICE* <u>IMMEDIATE FUTURE OF THE GRANT SCHEME</u> The Department has announced that the LPW scheme will continue for a further 4 years from April 2011. There will be an annual fixed maximum budget of £12 million, and the Department will discuss with faith groups and denominations how the scheme can best operate within that budget. The restriction to scope already announced from 4 January will remain in place- professional fees, and repairs to clocks, pews, bells and organs, will remain ineligible from 1 April. Further announcements will be made in due course. <u>CHANGES TO THE GRANT SCHEME</u> The Department for Culture, Media and Support very much regrets that, in line with the need to reduce public expenditure, funding for the scheme in 2010/11 has been reduced. William the Conqueror's niece Judith commissioned the west tower, nave and chancel in 1100. The tower arch and chancel arch remain from Norman times.

The very new and comfortable coach with rear steering wheels from Hemmings Coaches was a new addition to their fleet and John Staddon has set a new standard for coach comfort. The weekend started on Friday 20 August leaving Chagford at about 6am. One important part, other than meeting old friends, is reading the witty journal that appears every year. This year that publication excelled itself and proved to be very informative as well as amusing. This journal also provides historical details of the places being visited and is in itself compulsive reading.

The first tower on Friday, was in Herefordshire at Bromyard and this provided a welcome break to the journey. Lunch was in the beautiful town of Ludlow, Shropshire, with ringing there afterwards. This tower is reputed to be one of the finest rings of 10 bells in the country. The afternoon towers were Stanton Lacy and Cardington both in Shropshire. Our hotel for the weekend was the Sandford House Hotel in Shrewsbury. Friday night was an excuse for some to go on a pub crawl and travelling through the streets of Shrewsbury, there were wonderful examples of preserved architecture in the narrow back streets. Saturday was an early start, as usual with ringing at the nearby Meole Brace, and then back to Shrewsbury to ring at St Chad (12) 39-2-7 and then St Mary (10). More ringing took place in the afternoon at Oswestry and Welshpool, Powys. The evening meal was at the award winning pub, the Three Fishes in Fish Street, Shrewsbury.

Sunday ringing, after packing bags on the coach, was at Kington where we waited for the morning service to finish. The keep-like tower of c1200 is the oldest part of the church and tower access is up an outside staircase on the east wall of the tower. The substantial Sunday Lunch was in the nearby Burton Hotel and this fortified us for the last tower of the weekend at Eardisland. This is stated to be one of the best rings of eight in the country. The whole village of Eardisland was beautiful and forms part of the Black and White Village Trail that explores the attractive half-timbered, black and white villages to be found in northern Herefordshire. Don started to ring in the early 50s at Babbacombe and was instrumental in finally resurrecting the St Marychurch bells after the wartime bombing which demolished most of the church and killed and injured some of the congregation present at the time. Don's love of ringing at St Marychurch extended to encouraging the augmentation to 10 bells, being a part donor of one of the bells and having his name cast on it.

Don is still as active as ever, holding many positions within ringing associations and still runs a regular practice at Upton, Torquay. He is often to be seen at Association competitions encouraging his newer ringers and finding their potential and winning the novice competitions.

Don is not just a bell ringer, he has coached endless youngsters in swimming and he is involved in other sporting events and has been an umpire, judge and national coach.

International Year of Biodiversity

2010 has been designated International Year of Biodiversity by the United Nations whose buildings in New York and Nairobi both have bells that were rung on the 22 September when world leaders met to discuss biodiversity for the first time. The UN hoped that their bells will be joined by others around the world during the day, but this was not a request limited to churches. The Church of England is a supporter of International Year of Biodiversity UK and was invited by the organisers to encourage churches to join in this international initiative.

Knowing that time was short contact had been made with the Bishops' Environment Group, Diocesan Environment and Communication Officers along with 'Caring for God's Acre' and 'Ringing World' to encourage support from both ringers and the media and to ensure people hearing the bells would know why they are ringing.

Before making the announcement it was known that bells were being rung in Norfolk, Cambridge, Warwickshire, Oxfordshire, the Isle of Man and London.

As a result of a variety of publicity efforts a number of local bell ringing websites featured details including the Cambridge District and Shropshire Association sites and a radio interview was also given.

Wednesday was not an easy time for many bellringers, but enough messages from those who rang at some time between 12noon and 2pm were received to suggest that a reasonable number had taken part on the day.

Whilst the UN was looking to bells drawing attention to the crisis affecting biodiversity, the Church of England hoped that its bells would also celebrate the biodiversity in its many churchyards both rural and urban.

I wonder how many towers in Devon were involved and rang on the 22 September.?

The whole day's events ran very smoothly and Claude and Joyce and their organizers are to be congratulated for hosting such a successful event.</p>	<p>Dear Ringers. The first year of the Campaign to Ring for England to celebrate St. George on April 23rd was a wonderful success and I have been enormously encouraged by your tremendous response. However, there is a National dilemma for 2011 in that April 23rd falls within Holy Week when bells should not be rung. I wrote to the Archbishop of York to request his view on this matter and whether it would be possible to have a dispensation just for 2011 since the cause is the celebration of the Nation's Patron Saint.</p> <p>His reply - "Dear Libby.....Church Rules state that when St. George's Day falls within Holy Week the celebrations should move to the next available date in the calendar. Therefore, in the Church Calendar St. George's Day will be celebrated on Monday 2nd May 2011". He also re-affirmed his support for the Campaign which he has strongly supported from its inception but that no exception could be made for 2011 and so it will be celebrated 8 days later which is the Bank Holiday.</p> <p>I fear this will have very little meaning to the populace at large, and might even create a division between Bell Ringers. As a result it would be difficult for a full and collective response to ring out on the day. The BBC is very keen on the Campaign and I have had several meetings to this effect. They would love to be more involved, however, the caveat is that I have to get everyone on board, and this, patently will be impossible.</p> <p>My feeling on the matter is that we just have to accept this unusual situation, which will not be repeated for many years, and give 2011 a miss but - to make lots of noise as to why. There will of course be those that will want to ring anyway but, as a representative of a National Campaign, I do not wish to go against The Church's authority.</p> <p>On a more positive note, this will allow us time to co-ordinate, inform, involve, advertise and engage with every Region right across the country to make 2012 an even more stupendous, comprehensive, mammoth celebration. We will have the added bonus of riding on the back of the year of the Olympics. Whilst there might well be some Towers who are not interested in the Campaign I am delighted to say I received only positive e-mails with requests to continue and to this end I am most happy to oblige. It would be enormously helpful if you could engage with as many of your Ringers as possible letting me know what their thoughts might be on the problem and any ideas for its future. They could always contact me direct. I very much look forward to hearing from you and thank you for your help. It may be the hardened call change ringer would have been impressed by the standard of ringing. There were countless call change ringers there to listen and presumably judge. When ringing methods, it is difficult to get accurate striking as you are changing position or following a different bell at each stroke, handstroke or backstroke and having to think of where to go next. Some ringers are fortunate and do not have to concentrate on the method too much and they can then devote their attention to the striking.</p> <p>The many events at Crediton on the day provided varied interests to the many visitors. Why is it called a Sally?

A Sally is the fluffy part of a bellrope you hold at handstroke, but why is it called that? Edward Martin provided an answer to the Change Ringers list.

The word was certainly in use in Stedman's time and can be taken to refer both to the woolly bit of the rope, and the actual handstroke, as well as the movement of the rope. Perhaps the most illuminating quote is from page 134 of 'Tintinnologia', where in advising how to fix an odd struck bell, Campanista writes:

"but sometimes the fault of the stroke is in the Sally, which you may remedy by tying the Fillet (or little Cord above the rim of the Wheel, which causeth the dancing of the rope) nearer or farther off the main Spoke."

If you look up 'sally' in The Oxford English Dictionary, you find mention of sorties, sudden dashes and outgoings such as the old military term 'to sally forth'. But for the origin of the word we have to go back to the old French 'saille', noun from 'sailir'; which was a refashioning of the even older French 'salir', which in turn is from the Latin 'salire', to leap. It is related to 'salter' which is the frequentative of 'salire', from which we get the fancy word 'saltation' - leaping and dancing. The more common word 'sommersault' is likewise related, as is the word 'salmon', the name given by ancient Romans to the fish that leaps.

One meaning of the french noun saillie is a "bulge" in something such as a muscle or a bone. But that's because it comes from the verb 'sailir' (to protrude). It also means 'to emerge' (as in sally forth). It is a reasonable bet that 'sally' has a connection with the Latin verb 'salire' ('leap, jump, move spasmodically') and its derivatives. This is not to say that this is the best bet.

Devon County Show

After a successful Devon County Show in 2009 Devon Ringers' Council were invited back for 2010 and another very worthwhile 3 days were spent with the Frank Mack Garage Ring as part of the Churches stand. We had a good age range trying their hand and witnessed 174 people over the 3 days, all leaving resplendent with their "I've rung on the Devonshire Guild Mini-Ring" sticker. A big thank you to all helpers giving their time over the 3 days. The dates for the 2011 Devon County Show, where it is hoped to make it "3-in-a-row", are May 19th-21st. We are building on our experience and considering have a designated person selling draw tickets at this event, rather than rely on a person with other duties. No 'training' information is available as yet and this will be considered and training boards are still being negotiated and may need up dating and a designated person to man the boards. Any quarter peal attempts need to be at the end of the day to avoid anyone who wishes to 'have-a-go' having to wait for 20 minutes.

More Judges needed?

Looking at the scorecards for the Devon Association brings me to ask a question. What happens in judging if one judge marks one team heavier or lighter than the others, this would surely alter the scoring averages and overall final placings of teams. How about taking the mean average of how each individual judge has placed a team after giving his/her results to achieve the overall final result. An example below from your South Qualifier:

The first column is the result and on the far right the overall standings taken from the mean averages of the judges placings. A slight difference between 4 and 5 and a tie at 8 and 9 shows a higher or lower mark from judges may have swayed this. Taking a mean average may encourage more people to take up judging your events, without fear of being way off the fault scoring process as long as their positioning is right. I hear there is a strong need for more judges in Devon ringing events. Comments please. James Wood.
