BEST KEPT SECRET AT KINGSBRIDGE?

There has been a church on the site of St Thomas of Canterbury in Kingsbridge since before the 10th century, it has a wonderful altar and rood screen but many local people have never been inside the church so a booklet has been published to try to raise its image. Full of colour photographs it shows what the people who hurry by the church at the top of the hill on the edge of town are missing. It is a church in very good repair with a font dating from Norman times, a porch added in Tudor times and beautiful stained glass windows full of biblical stories. The bell tower dates from the 14th century and was designed as a place of refuge during raids and riots. Warning beacons could be lit on top of the tower and the bells were rung to alarm residents that the Spanish Armada had been sighted off Bolt Head, a few miles away. Most people in Kingsbridge know about St Edmund's parish church in the town centre the older Dodbrooke church is nowhere near so well known. Yet there is a large housing estate next door and a primary school alongside it. The booklet, to raise awareness rather than funds, costs £2 and can be obtained from the church which, unusually these days, is open from 8am to 3.30pm every day.

CREDITON RINGERS' CELEBRATION

The bells on Saturday 17 November rang out across Crediton for nearly three-and-a-half hours to mark the diamond wedding anniversary of Queen Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh. The then Princess Elizabeth married Prince Philip at Westminster Abbey on November 20, 1947. The master of the Ancient Society of College Youths has accepted an invitation to bring an elite band of members to ring the 12 bells of the Church of Holy Cross, Crediton. The College Youths, formed in 1637, are the oldest ringing society in England, and its members ring the bells at St Paul's Cathedral and Westminster Abbey. They rang a special peal of 5,040 different changes of Bristol Surprise Maximus to mark

changes of Bristol Surprise Maximus to mark the royal 60th wedding anniversary. Event co-ordinator Howard Egglestone said: "Many ringers from the area came in to Crediton to hear our distinguished visitors perform on our new peal of bells and were not disappointed.

STOLEN BELLS BACK IN MERTON

Three bells belonging to All Saints Church in Merton were stolen while awaiting repair in Tavistock. Parishioners had raised £6,000 to restore six bells, which had hung silent for 15 years. Churchwarden, Mary Ford, said: "The whole community here is relieved and pleased that they are back. It really shows how much this community wants to hear the bells ringing again. All our prayers have been answered." The bells were found in Manchester after a tip off. The church is still raising funds for repairs to the tower to be made.

RINGERS ON A ROUND ROBIN

John Kelly enjoyed a free birthday train trip through South Devon to celebrate his 72rd birthday last year. He set off on the steam train, before transferring to a ferry and special bus, to visit churches in Paignton, Kingswear, Dartmouth and Totnes. John was joined by ringers from across South Devon at each of his stops, where they rang bells and raised over £250 for the Dame Hannah Rogers Trust in lyybridge. John, who lives in Paignton, was given use of the steam train in recognition of his 40 years working at Dart Valley Railway. Barry Cogar, general manager at Dart Valley Railway, was full of praise for John's loyal service work as a signalman and his dedication to bell-ringing.

Berry Pomeroy Appeal

Berry Pomeroy Parish has spent £250,000 on refurbishing the church. The next phase is repair of the bells and bell frame costing a cool £45,000 and church reserves are totally exhausted!

In England it is customary to ring the bells in a harmonious peal, in which all are rung at the same time, the volume of sound thus produced being enormous and the effect very beautiful, particularly at a distance. We have a full written record and diagrams of our own eight bells and detailed photographs of them. We have received plenty of fund-raising ideas from the Central Council of Church Bellringers. PULLING STRINGS ON SMALL SCALE

Phil Stevens, bell captain at St Mary's Kingskerswell is very pleased. He has recruited three new members for the church bell ringers after a mini ring with six bells was set up in the parish centre. It attracted a lot of attention, and from publicity point was very good. The mini-rings loaned by the Guild of Devonshire Ringers was created by the late Frank Mack in 1963 as the first true mini-ring. The bells together weigh only 7lb 14oz. This had been the first outing for them under ownership of the guild. This was an excellent way to promote church bell ringing and let the public see what actually happens.

RINGOUT WILD BELLS 2

The Ringers' Council organised an event as part of the Exeter Autumn 2007 Festival at St Petrock's Church, Exeter High Street on Friday 2nd November at 7.30pm. Live performances of bell ringing and readings were given about the development and heritage of bell ringing. It was a marvellous opportunity for people to discover the fascinating history and unique music of this ancient British art. The Ringers' Council has decided not to take part in the Exeter Autumn 2008 Festival.

We enjoyed some good striking on the back eight and the 10! Our final tower on the Friday was at Corfe

Mullen. Two Dorset gentlemen expecting some decent striking met us! To be fair we did ring them pretty well, but they were not the easiest peal of six. They sounded rather like Lustleigh, but upstairs and a tricky set. The Hon Sec produced his medicine bottle and many enjoyed a fine tipple of sloe gin. We then travelled a short distance (thanks to sat nav!) to our digs in Wimborne Road. This was an eight-bedroom guesthouse -- very comfortable, accommodating landlady and a bar. Cathedral Ringers Explain

At the Bishopsteignton Probus Club in April the meeting room at the Cockhaven Manor resounded with the sound of live hand bells, a model church tower bell and recordings of bells, as the 39 members present, together with guests enjoyed a fascinating presentation given by the Exeter Cathedral Tower Captain, lan Campbell, and two of his colleagues. Bell ringing has evolved over 400 - 500 years, originating with the requirement for churches to ring a bell to call the faithful to prayer. By the 16th Century, more than one bell was being used, possibly due to the community use of church buildings. More elaborate use of bells became possible with advances in technology, particularly the fixing of the bell to the wheel. Church bells are made of copper and tin. The swinging of the bell through 360 degrees improves its tone. It stops with its mouth upwards and its movement can be controlled. The number of bells determines the number of changes which can be made. With six bells there are 720 possible changes, 5,040 with seven. It would take 350 years to ring all the changes with 12 bells. Computer simulations give perfect bell ringing, but the slight imperfections in live performances are thought to enhance their musicality.

Bishopsteignton has six bells, the cathedral has 12. It was in late Victorian times that guilds and associations were formed. Each diocese has a bell adviser and a great deal of bell restoration is being done. During the question and answer session, Philip Gourd informed the meeting that the bells at St John's Church, Bishopsteignton, were the exact twin of the original Bow Bells, having been cast together with those made for the church of St Mary le Bow in London.

The Bishop and David and Valerie Row

Doing a favour for a Bishop of Exeter paid off handsomely for David and Valerie Row. David's parents had put up the Right Rev Charles Curzon at their Pennsylvania home during the Exeter Blitz, during which the Bishop's Palace damaged.

It was a favour the Bishop was happy to return some years later when in 1947 David and Valerie married at Bishopsteignton Parish Church. David said: "He was a wonderful chap and readily agreed to marry us at the church where my parents had wed. It was a wonderful day." And one remembered particularly today by the couple, now of Topsham, who are celebrating their diamond wedding anniversary.

David, born in Topsham and baptised there, had met Valerie during the war when she was based in Boston, Massachusetts.

A former midshipman cadet at the Nautical Training Establishment HMS Worcester - and one of the few navy men to have carried out sail drill amid the masts of HMS Worcester and the Cutty Sark - he had seen duty on the grim Arctic convoys to Murmansk aboard the 20,000-tonne cruiser.

When the ship needed special repairs, it embarked for Boston, Mass, of all places, and it was there that David met and fell in love with Valerie.

David said: "It just happened she was the only Wren in Boston and would you believe it, she had virtually grown up in Bishopsteignton. We had a wonderful time and were eventually married by Bishop Curzon at Bishopsteignton."

David was given command of his own ship, the frigate HMS Padstow Bay, but it was short-lived for the ship was soon decommissioned. It was during one of those tours that David visited Hiroshima. He said: "It was not that long after the atom bomb had been dropped and it was absolutely awful. You could not believe how terrible it was until you actually saw the devastation."

Back home there were staff appointments and David, now a lieutenant commander, served under the Commander in Chief, Plymouth, Admiral Sir Richard Onslow.

David and Valerie now live in Elm Grove Road, Topsham, near their son Jeremy.

In retirement David, who recently received the special Arctic Convoy Campaign Medal commissioned by a grateful Russian government, has rediscovered his love of bellringing. He said: "There was national shortage of bell ringers for the Millennium, so I put my head above the parapet and volunteered to help out.

"Now, every Sunday I ring the bells at my parish church in Topsham for the glory of God and the pleasure of man.

"I have to say I have been very lucky."

Raising Awareness of Our Unique Tradition

At the recent Committee Meeting in February, the Secretary wished that members revisit this area since it is in our constitution and number of ringers/teams continue to fall.

This was to target current members and the general public. Yes, locally towers do much work to try and keep their bells ringing. There is much to be learnt from towers, which have a plentiful supply of enthusiastic and capable ringers. However, the Association has a duty to promote call change ringing – this can be done on a county and local level.

At this Committee Meeting much useful discussion lasting nearly 30 minutes occurred on this interesting and important topic. Mr Avery reminded members of the Devon Ringers Council commitment to try to attend Devon County Show in 2009. Mr Trist mentioned efforts made by training centres such as the Troyte Centre at Huntsham and the possibility of the BBC coming to the Major Final. Further potential from the Road Show and the National Event was highlighted. Mr G Sharland suggested an assistant Publicity Officer to help Mr Webster - this was put on hold and would be discussed with Mr Webster. Mr Quance mentioned the Shebbear College and teaching 12 youngsters at Shebbear. The question was asked - Should we approach local schools? The Child Protection Issue was sited as an important consideration. Other organisations to approach would include Brownies/Scouts, Young Farmers Clubs and ' Women's Institutes for instance. Advertising in the parish magazine realised a positive response after some seven months at Paignton. Granted that the drop out rate was always high, but that young ringers once confident and able to ring could, and often do come back to ringing later. The President Mr Mugridge said it was vitally important to keep the belfries 'alive' and in regular use.

The realisation that most new ringers were mature people was specially sited by Mr Rhymes, where the Woodleigh Deanery monthly meetings were very well attended but lacked the presence of youngsters. This was a common experience, but some towers were fortunate enough to have young ringers in the locality.

Mr Way suggested that it be down to the local team. However, members were again reminded that they were the 'branches' of the Association 'Tree' and that they should continue to promote activity back in the towers in their region. Ultimately the foundation of the Association continues to be at the grass root level, where the Committee should do all in its power to assist/ensure new and continued ringing activity occurs.

In summary, it was agreed that the Secretary would write an article on this topic for Devon Calls and that we re-visit this area at the next meeting.

LUNDY ISLAND SOCIETY'S FIRST EVER DEVON CALL CHANGE COMPETITION.

The bells of Lundy have rung out for the last ten years thanks to the work of Bob Caton and the Lundy Island Society, and whilst there have been many visiting bands both method and call change on the island this years annual festival saw a mix of both with the Moorland Ringers from Dartmoor attending this year's festival. The call change competition was on 24th of February 2008.

To even things out a bit the bands were formed from a mix of call change ringers and method ringers, a number of which had turned up when the Moorland Ringers were ringing in the previous days to get a bit early of practice in.

Once the bands were sorted out in Devon tradition the draw was undertaken. The teams commenced the rise, sixty on thirds and lower with the same rules as in Devon Association Competitions.

Mervyn Way of Chawleigh who has judged many Devon competitions was tucked away with his pencil and book.

The occasional open hand stroke would creep in, there was the missed change and most bands faults were in rise and lower. The third team to ring having raised the bells realised they had no one in the band to call the changes, this was sorted out by the scrutineer and matters were back on track.

At the conclusion of the ringing all adjourned to the Marisco Tavern where having gained sustenance (The beer was excellent !!) the results were given out. Both the scrutineer and judge praising the standard of ringing and the effort put in by all those that took part.

A good afternoon was had by all and talking afterwards I am sure it will encourage a few to enter the National Call Change Competition later in the year.

Participants were Jen Pascoe (Devon), Barry Trevethan (Devon), David Mattingley (Cornwall), Neil Thomas (Norfolk), Bob Caton (Somerset) and Peter Furniss (Merseyside).

This event posed two questions was this the first ever Devon style Call Change Competition on the Island?

And what would be the prospects of holding another one?

Devon Church Bell Restoration Fund Report for Devon Association AGM on 10 November 2007

Sadly, the most significant event of 2007 was the death of John Scott in July. It was in no small part due to John that the DCBRF came into being in 1972, having its first formal meeting in February 1973. As Diocesan Bell Advisor, John chaired the committee until 2003, a total of 30 years, and continued as a trustee until his death. His immense knowledge of Devon's towers and bells and his wise counsel will be sorely missed. At a Special General Meeting of the Guild in October, Ian Campbell – tower captain at Exeter Cathedral – was elected as trustee to replace John.

During the year the usual two meetings were held; in Holy Week at the home of Brian Drake, and this morning in the Mortimer Room at North Tawton Church.

At the beginning of the year the Fund stood at £25,385. Since that time four grants totalling £8,900 have been paid. These were £4,500 to East Worlington towards a complete rehang of the six bells in a new frame with all new fittings; £500 to Germansweek towards frame repairs, new headstocks and part new fittings; £1,100 to Buckland-in-the-Moor for refurbishment of clappers, replacement of pulleys and some bearings, and stripping and repainting the frame; and £2,800 to Zeal Monachorum towards retuning and rehanging the bells with all new fittings in the existing frame.

Income during the year has amounted to £8,800, including over £800 from the Rambling Ringers' Tour, £1,000 from the Guild as agreed at their AGM in June, £2,800 from the Association following the Annual Draw, £250 from the competition in July organized by Graham Sharland in aid of the BRF, £200 from the National Call Change Competition at Branscombe in September, £400 from the Troyte Ringing Centre, £200 from the Ottery St Mary ringers, and £500 from peal and quarter peal ringers in the Guild, much of that being Gift-Aided. Added to that, Gift Aid claimed for the period 2002 - 2006 totalled over £600. As ever, we are most grateful for any donation, no matter how small; and please remember, if you are a tax-payer any donation may be gift-aided, giving us an extra 28 pence for every pound donated (25 pence

from next May). We now have our own Gift-Aid Envelopes available. At present the Fund stands at approximately £25,300.

Grants agreed this year include £200 to Hockworthy towards rehanging their three bells for swing-chiming in a strengthened frame, and £900 to Lustleigh for replacement of bearing seals and races, insulation pads and runner boards, and cleaning down and repainting the frame.

On the morning of the AGM the following grants were agreed:

Berry Pomeroy £6,000 Sampford Spiney £5,500

Grants previously agreed, but not yet taken up include £1,500 to Plymouth, Emmanuel, where work should have started last month, but has now been delayed until early next year following renewed debate as to the treatment of the bell-frame. All other grants made more than five years ago are to be regarded as void, and I will be writing to those churches concerned advising them to make a fresh application if they are still intending to have work carried out.

Assuming that all of the agreed grants are taken up, the uncommitted balance of the Fund stands at approximately £11,200.

During the last 18 months the Rules of the DCBRF have been revised to take into account decisions made over the years and current legislation. Having been agreed by the committee and approved by the Charity Commission they were formally adopted at this morning's meeting. The new rules are not designed to alter the way in which the Fund works, but merely to clarify its administration and to give the trustees more flexibility when considering grant applications. The one significant change, as previously mentioned, is that if the offer of a grant is not taken up within five years, it will be deemed void, the reason being that over that period of time further deterioration may well have occurred to the bell installation, and the work required may have significantly changed; also over five years costs would inevitably have risen, and a new application taking this into account would be eminently desirable.
