A church faces prosecution after four bell ringers almost died from carbon monoxide poisoning. Paramedics said they had cherry red faces, typical of a near fatal dose, after a boiler leak. All six ringers were discharged from hospital but safety officials are investigating and police police have not ruled out criminal proceedings. If your ringing chamber has a gas boiler, or it is nearby, please make checks for the safety of all.

Obituary - Gerald Stevens - 2 Dec 1921 - 15 Nov 2011

West Down Parish Church was packed to capacity on Wednesday November 23 as family, ringers and many friends from all over Devon gathered for the thanksgiving service of Gerald Stevens. This followed a private cremation service that day. The service was conducted by The Revd Robert Harris. These words are taken from tributes given by his daughter Margaret, and grand-daughter Claire Stevens. There were 2 more reading by granddaughter Heather Kingdon and grandson Peter Morrish.

"My father was born in Langtree on December 2nd 1923. He started to learn to ring when he was 10 years old, but I feel sure that he would have gone along with his father Charlie and sat in the belfry at a much earlier age. His first competition was at South Molton in 1935, and rang his first Devon Competition at Kings Nympton in 1936 on the 2nd and his father ringing treble. They came 7th out of 20 odd teams!

The family moved to Brookham and dad rang with Fremington. In 1939 the Devon Final was held at West Alvington and he won his first Devon title. He was the youngest ringer at 17 years old to win the Six Bell Championship. I think I am right in saying that he held this record until 1996 when Andrew Phillips then 16 rang for Mortehoe winning the Devon Final at Bere Ferres.

Mum and dad got married 12 February 1947, in this church; they had the bells, of course! There was plenty of snow about at that time. Ivor Hookway said it was the coldest day that he had ever rung. They blamed dad for picking this date!

Mum and Dad then moved to Delworthy. Dad and my grandfather rang with St Giles until 1956. He won his 2nd Devon shield with St Giles at Stoke Fleming in 1952. He followed this up by taking 2nd place in 1953/54. Dad began his long association with West Down Ringers in 1956 when the family moved to Hewish Barton. He entered his first competition with West Down on 6 Oct 1956 ringing at Dolton.

My father went on to win the Devon Finals at Landkey in 1957. At 34 years old he was the **oldest** West Down's team! This meant that he had rung with 3 different teams that had won the Major Devon Final, Fremington, St Giles and West Down. From 1957 to 1975 dad helped West Down to win the Championship 10 times, runners up 7 times, and 3rd twice. West Down won the shield 3 years running 1962, 1963 and 64. They were the first team to score a hat trick! Ivor, the only one left of that team now, told me of the time they had been to a competition. Mervyn Phillips and Len Smale had dropped dad back home at Hewish, They then decided to have a game with him! They unhinged the gate down the lane and re-hung it upside down so that when dad went ringing the next morning he would have to re-hang the gate first! Well the joke backfired as it was my grandfather that was the first one down the lane, when he took the milk churns out that morning!

Dad did get into a scrape or two when he was ringing. After he had rung at a competition at Yarnscombe, Dad and Len were messing around coming down the church path. Len playfully pushed dad, who fell down and ended up in hospital with a dislocated shoulder! Another time was when we were ringing at Mortehoe and the tenor man lost his trousers in the rise. My father was ringing treble and rang all the way through without noticing, even though Fred and I were laughing our heads off!

My father was delighted when I learnt to ring. I rang with him in a number of competitions. The last time West Down won the Devon Shield was at Kentisbeare in 1987, when dad, Fred and I were ringing.

My brother Bryan and my daughter Sue learnt to ring. This enabled four generations of the Stevens family to ring together, with mum also taking part. After a few years ringing with Mortehoe, my father returned to ring with West Down in 1999.

In 2002 Dad was elected President of The Devon Association of Bell Ringers. This was a position which he held for I year This was a real honour and really enjoyed his term in office attending various functions that were held around the county.

In 2005 dad had the idea to get a team together of over 80 year olds to ring in a competition. It was not quite as easy as he thought to find 6 ringers over eighty so he had to come down in age, slightly though! He called the team "The 468ers" this was their combined ages. They were aged between 83 and 73. Dad was the eldest at 83! He thought about where they should ring and decided that perhaps the annual competition at Littleham would be a suitable place. He approached Claude Nicholls who agreed and after a practice, at Weare Giffard they entered the competition and came 1st with 14 faults. He made sure that never forget that result!

He continued ringing with West Down ringing at practice nights, Sunday Services and Competitions until the end of 2007 when ill health forced him to hang up his rope!

His last competition was at Monkleigh in November, when both Fred and I rang with him and the rest of West Down team".

"Granddad was a hard working, fun loving and caring family man. He had many virtues, although patience was not one of them. If something needed doing, tomorrow was not soon enough. Today was good, but yesterday was better!

Granddad and Grandma started their married life together by buying a farm at Higher Delworthy, Yarnscombe. They lived there for 9 years, during which time their two daughters Margaret and Maureen were born. They made many friends there, but the urge to expand led them to Hewish Barton, a farm of 373 acres. With the help of loyal workers

Fred Thorne, Fred Quick and later Peter Shapland, a very busy life continued.

In 1960, to their delight, Bryan their son was born. Gerald was so proud of his family. Fortunately, good health and good fortune prevailed for many years, during which time he enjoyed hunting with the Dulverton West fox hounds. Gerald was a good horseman. He loved his horses, having from earlier in his life taken part in many gymkhanas and riding with the Torrington farmers hunt.

He took a keen interest and an active part in local politics, firstly with Marwood, and later becoming Chairman and president of the North Devon Conservative Association and the Conservative club at Barnstaple.

He enjoyed shooting and all country sports. Bell ringing was a huge pleasure to him, as auntie Margaret has said. The family was very important to him. He loved each and every one of them dearly, taking great pride in their achievements and lives.

In 1977, Grandma and Granddad moved into The Beeches, a bungalow which they had built on part of the farm. Sadly his health deteriorated as the years went by, but he was determined not to let it become too much of a problem. He would always say "I shall be alright" and believed he was able to do the things that needed doing, although his lack of mobility caused him much frustration. He would say "if you just bring a chair, I will cut the garden hedge, or mow the lawn. Or even take the tractor or ATV to Bryan and Lyn's for a haircut. We have all heard him shout "Eileen", to get her to hold the ladder while he checks that loose tile. Granddad never complained about taking his medication and was so happy with all the great care he had from all the family, the health service and his careers, all of whom looked after him so well and this allowed him to remain in his home. His most loving and loyal carer was of course Grandma.

Granddad's memory served him well and he would laugh about various happenings that he could recall over the years. His fun with Bryan's shoot at Spreacombe, including taking part as being dressed up as Farmer Ayseed for charity on a charity beaters day. He loved people coming to see him and to talk to him.

They were married for 64 years and to say they never had a cross word would be wrong, but they would always agree to differ.

He loved his dogs and the last year or two his cats, especially Pebbles, who would curl up on his lap and go to sleep.

A muffled peal was rung before the service by George Rogers, Tony Jeffrey, Tony Barrable, Nick Williams, John Barnes, and John Conibear.

Diamond Jubilee and Olympic Ringing

The Central Council of Church Bell Ringers would particularly like to encourage as much ringing as possible over the long weekend of the Diamond Jubilee. Many communities will be organising different types of celebrations on different days and ringers should establish what is planned locally and ensure that ringing forms a key part of these events. If there are no local plans, ringers are urged to take the lead and arrange special ringing at a suitable time, and consider notifying local media of what is happening and why.

The authorities have suggested that the best time would be ringing on Tuesday June 5, to coincide with the service at St Paul's. We are therefore suggesting to ringers:

- as much ringing as possible across the country on Tuesday 5 June, including in particular along the processional route from the Palace to St Paul's;
- ringing at London towers along the river route to ring for the Thames Pageant on Sunday 3 June (Surrey, Middlesex, ASCY, SRCY);
- 3. local ringing for any Big Jubilee Lunches also on Sunday 3 June;
- local ringing for visits by HM or other members of the Royal Family during the year;
- 5. local ringing for any other local church services or celebrations;
- 6. ringing for the lighting of the beacons on Monday 4 June.

Olympic Ringing

The issue of ringing at 8 am on Friday 27 July has been the subject of further correspondence. There should be as much Olympic ringing as possible and ringers should aim for as much local publicity as possible so that the reason for ringing is known, whether on 27 July, during the earlier Torch Relay or for other special events or celebrations. July 27 will be a good day to ring for the opening of the Olympics, whether at 8 am or at another time that day, whatever suits local ringers and conditions.

DCBRF Report for Devon Association AGM 12 Nov 2011

During 2011 the Devon Church Bell Restoration Fund has been involved with 16 towers at some stage in their restoration projects. Fortunately the number of requests for assistance we have received during the year has tailed off somewhat, enabling us to take something of a breather following the demands of the previous year. During the year the usual two meetings were held; in Holy Week at Ian Campbell's home in Exeter, and this morning at the home of Brian Drake

At the beginning of the year the Fund stood at £26,021. Since that time seven grants totalling £15,040 have been paid. These were:

£3,000 to Sheepstor for tuning the six bells and rehanging on new headstocks with part new fittings in the existing frame;

£1,400 to Plymtree towards the provision of new bearings, one new headstock, and refurbishing clappers and wheels;

£5,000 to Stoodleigh towards a complete rehang of the six bells in a new steel frame with all new fittings;

£400 to **Chittlehampton** towards the cost of painting the bell-frame;

£2,800 to High Bray towards rehanging the bells in a repaired frame with new or refurbished fittings and new foundation beams;

£440 to Uffculme for overhauling the bearings and clappers; and

£2,000 to Brentor towards replacing the severely corroded sub-frame, dismantling, cleaning down and painting the bell-frame, refurbishing clappers and bearings, and replacing wheels, pulleys and bell bolts.

Additionally, between the Association's 2010 AGM and the end of the year, three further grants had been paid. These were:

£350 to Sourton towards repairs to the corroded sub-frame:

Ropes by Malcolm Brown

Malcolm Brown is ready to supply bell ropes to Devon. Malcolm started ringing in Kent and then moved to Nottingham where he got involved in Belfry maintenance. About ten years ago he started making bell wheels and other fittings and dealt with everything wooden including wheels, stays, sliders and pulleys.

A few years ago he started making bellropes and this is now his main business. Malcolm can make and repair ropes for ringing, he also makes ropes with little sallies for chiming bells. Sallies can be any colour and the most popular ones are red white and blue.

Most his work has been in the Midlands and near his home in Gloucestershire although he has had some work in Devon such as ropes for Salcombe and Slapton.

Malcolm has had strong links with Devon over the years and has rung in call change competitions.

£420 to Brixton towards refurbishing clappers and bearings, replacing pulley sheaves, and generally cleaning down and painting; and

£550 to Chittlehampton towards refurbishing wheels and bearings, rebushing clappers and replacing pulleys.

Income during the year has amounted to £10,363, including £1,000 from the Guild as agreed at their Annual General Meeting in June, a further £2,377 from Peal and Quarter Peal ringers and personal donations, £5,000 from the Association following the Annual Draw, £272 from the Guild Branches, £263 from the competition in July organised by Graham Sharland in aid of the DCBRF, £110 from other competitions, £700 from the Ottery St Mary ringers, £200 from the Troyte Ringing Centre and £110 from other individual towers, tax refunds following gift-aided donations and investment income making up the balance. At present the Fund stands at £21,027.

Grants agreed this year include a further £1,000 to Stoke Canon, making their total grant offer up to £7,500 against a total bill of some £93,000. At this morning's meeting the following grants were agreed:

Shirwell - £1,800, towards replacing rotted sections of the bell-frame with new galvanised steel sections, and inserting additional steel beams under the existing sub-frame.

Cullompton - £300, towards the painting of the bell-frame.

Thorverton - £400, towards rebushing the clappers and replacing worn pulley seaves. Assistance has also been received from Hawkchurch, East Ogwell and Cruwys Morchard. If the agreed grants are taken up, the uncommitted balance of the Fund stands at £11,027. IVJS. November 2011

The 10th Anniversary of The Wednesday Evening Ringers Association 2001 – 2011 "Celebration trip to York Minster"

On 27th June 2001 under the leadership of Scott Adams, a group of call-change ringers met at St Pauls Church, Tiverton, for what was to turn out and be the first meeting of The Wednesday Evening Ringers Association. The aim was to get to some like-minded friends together for an evening of good ringing, good company and good drinking! Over the years the group has steadily grown and flourished. Members come from all over Devon and meet at least once per month. The Wednesday Evening Ringers Association have now visited over 100 different towers in Devon; have had several enjoyable tours to various parts of England; hold an annual Christmas dinner; and compete regularly in the newly created Devon 10-Bell competition. To mark the 10th anniversary of the Association, we embarked on our most ambitious winter tour yet: to ring the bells at York Minster as well as several prominent Cathedrals in England.

On Thursday 24th November 2011 at 7.15am, 14 ringers and two mini-buses left the car park of The Nags Head Inn just outside of Taunton to travel to York to ring the Minster bells. The ringers were Scott Adams, Sue Ashton, Stuart Bennie, Steven Came, Jereme Darke, Suzanne Driscoll, Stephen Herniman, Christine Ley, Louise Hornabrook, Paul Wright, Graham Sharland plus a few older ringers to give experience and "gravitas" to the tour namely, Colin Adams, Tony Jeffery and myself, Chris Clayton. Unfortunately, Lee Avery, James & Kathryn Kerslake and Fred & Margaret White were unable to join us on this occasion. Sadly, at the last minute, both Mervyn Langdon and Sam Massey were not well enough to attend. As we had an early start from Taunton, seven of the party staved the previous night at the Taunton Travelodge. Everyone was on time for the start and a swift exit was made to travel to Strensham Services (M5) for breakfast. After a good breakfast we travelled to Lincoln. Arriving at Lincoln, lunch was had in The Magna Carta Inn. At 1.45pm we assembled by the west door of Lincoln Cathedral and were met by the tower captain who took us up the 110 odd steps to the ringing chamber. We rang these lovely bells for an hour and a quarter. Afterwards we were allowed out onto the Cathedral roof to see the superb views over Lincoln city and the surrounding countryside. Once on the bus again we travelled north, over the Humber Bridge, to our final tower of the day, Kingston-upon-Hull. Kingston bells were very good but not quite in the same class as Lincoln Cathedral. However, we must have rung the 8, 10 and 12 bells quite well as the locals who came along to listen were very complimentary. We then left Kingston and headed to our accommodation for the first evening which was to be The Ferguson Fawsitt Arms at Walkington near Beverley. A very good choice: good food, good beer and we were well looked after by Yasmin, a local farmer's daughter! Some of the party also had several nightcaps of whiskey at The Barrels pub just down the road to round off the evening.

Friday saw us heading eastwards into Beverley to ring at Beverley Minster. A peal of 10 reputed to be the best peal of 10 bells in Britain. The 41.5 cwt tenor is a superb bell with a wonderful tone, but inside very noisy

and not easy to hear the front bells. I believe sound control is on their list of priorities. Once back on the mini-buses we headed cross-country to Selby Abbey. These were an outstanding peal of 10 bells with two trebles added to make a peal of 12 bells, which I didn't feel added much to the peal except numbers. Several of their local ringers came along to listen and film our rises and lowers and we acquitted ourselves very well! Lunch was at the Weatherspoons pub in Ripon. After a nice few pints and a good meal we were ready to ring Ripon Cathedral. These for me were the outstanding peal of the weekend; a peal of 12 bells, with a tenor of 23cwt. I think the thing that stands out in my mind besides the lovely tone, was the clarity of every bell strike. It made to my mind for some superb striking. We then left Ripon and headed off to the Premier Inn at York which would be our base for the next two nights. This was a very comfortable base situated just outside one of the city gates and conveniently opposite a Weatherspoons! Dinner that night was at The Royal Oak Inn at Goodramgate. An upstairs room was all ready for us and an excellent meal was provided. After dinner it was a walk back through the "Shambles" which was full of city night life. One or two even managed a few sneaky ports en-route back to the Weatherspoons pub.

All were up on the Saturday morning for breakfast looking fairly well "rested". We then headed eastwards back to Beverley for the 34cwt ring at St Mary's. These we all thought were better than the Minster and were lovely to ring. Quite a few locals came to hear us (had our fame spread?). The hour passed much too quickly and then it was off to Howden Minster. Howden was our only peal of 8 bells of the tour. They have been likened to Chewton Mendip in Somerset. Half the Minster is a ruin but the bells went very well indeed. We then journeyed back to York for a late lunch on the hoof as we walked through the city centre towards the Minster. This was going to be the highlight of the tour. By this time my legs were getting tired from all the steps we had climbed. We started off at York Minster with a couple of rises, changes and lowers on the middle 8 which had a tenor weight of 30cwt, before the back 10 and full 12 were rung. The tenor is 59cwt and is the fourth heaviest ringing bell in the World. It was a real privilege to be able to ring here; we must have put up a credible performance since the tower captain said we could come any time. At this point I would like to congratulate the heavy bell ringers, especially in the strapping up. Being Devon ringers we tended to raise and lower each peal.

The strapping at Beverley St Mary with a tenor of 34cwt was especially good. From where I stood on treble bell it looked effortless. On leaving the Minster and walking back to the hotel several of the party made various detours into the many ale houses en-route. One of them was The Star Inn, a famous watering hole situated in the heart of the old quarter. Dinner was back at The Royal Oak Inn, Goodramgate. This time we were served by Alex with the usual good attention. Afterwards we made a slow walk back through the throngs of people in the city centre to our hotel. One stop on the way back that some of us made was to a church which had been converted into a nightclub. Sure enough, as we had been told, bell ropes were hanging above the bar! You can get permission to ring the bells but only early mornings when the nightclub is empty. Most eventually returned to the Weatherspoons before sloping off to bed at various times. Sunday dawned all too soon with an 8.45am departure from the hotel. Our first tower on the way back to Devon was Coventry Cathedral to ring after the morning service. I remember Coventry Cathedral as being superb. Perhaps I was getting a little tired or maybe a bit jaded, but I didn't think my ringing was up to the usual standard! The tower captain did tell us that he wished his ringers would ring their bells as well as we had done. Some of the group made there way up to the top of the tower where there was a fabulous view over the Coventry skyline to be seen. Lunch was had in one of the many eateries in Birmingham city centre after which we assembled for our last tower of the tour, St. Martin-in-the-Bullring, Birmingham. Dwarfed by the ultra modern Selfridges and Next shopping centres you cannot see the church until you are very close. Here I

2011 in numbers by James Kerslake

As many of you will know, since 2003 I have been collecting results of all the competitions held in Devon and compiling them into a league table to show which teams are most consistent over the course of the year. The basic idea is to count up how many other teams a particular team has beaten over the course of a season and then average it out over the number of competitions that particular team has entered, the best team being the one that on average beats the most teams. In order to see who is 'best' I produce two tables – one for teams that have rung in five or more competitions and another for any teams that have entered at least one event – of these I consider the top team of the restricted table to be the league winner and 'best team in Devon' with a honourable mention to the team that finishes top of the 'all comers' table, as very often this is a side that has won the only competition it has entered. The only competitions I use in the league are those events held between April and November, and only those where teams rise, ring either of the competition peals (6 or 8 bell) and then lower.

During the last 12 months ringers around the county have started to send me results from past competitions and currently my results archive goes back to 1972 (although it is far from complete between 1972 and 1986) and consequently I, or at least the computer code I've written, can produce league tables throughout that era so we can see which teams were strong in the past. Both the results archive and the past tables are searchable from my website: www.myconid.co.uk. As with any endeavour like this, the more results that go into the archive the more accurate the league tables will be and the more little 'factoids' can be produced – and everyone likes a good statistic!

This year I have also managed to obtain, for the first time, the names of the ringers that were in the teams which won all of the main Devon Association competitions, which I think we should commemorate in a similar way in which method ringers keep records of who has rung in every full peal ever rung. To this end, Ian Avery and David Trout have been kind enough to send me the names of the ringers who have been in each of the winning Kingsteignton and Eggbuckland teams in their respective finals, which have produced some interesting facts. I've given the names of all the ringers in the winning teams at the 2 qualifiers and 3 finals below and also the facts uncovered.

The statistics:

All the statistics I've given in this article pertain only to the competitions used in compiling the league. So what of 2011?

Last year saw 70 teams compete in 50 events, of which 36 teams competed in more than five events. This is a drop of 21 teams from last year and also 2 fewer competitions than last year, however the number of teams entering multiple events has remained stable for the last two or three years.

There were a total 499 competition entries averaging 57.03 faults per team; giving a total of 28,456 faults scored at an average of 569.12 per competition. The lowest total fault score for a competition was 114 (at an average of 28.50) at the Plymouth and Ivybridge Deaneries competition held at Stoke Damerel, whilst the lowest average score was achieved at the Iddesleigh competition where 367 faults were scored at an average of 26.21. The highest total and average fault scores of 1432½ and 119.40 respectively were scored at Stoke Gabriel's annual event. Eggbuckland achieved the lowest fault score of the year, 4 at Iddesleigh, and the lowest average fault score, 18.18 faults per competition, while Salcombe gained the most number of faults in one competition, 328½, and Frithelstock had the highest average, 155.54 faults per competition. Brand new competitions for last year were the events held at Frithelstock and Great Torrington as part of a three tower festival with Monkleigh, and those we welcomed back after an absence were the Nationals on 6 and 8 bells and the twin tower event of Lydford and Bridestowe. Competitions sadly missing from last year that happened in 2010 were those at Eggbuckland, Bishops Nympton, Mariansleigh, Chawleigh, Beaford and Littleham as well as the Hartland Deanery and Newton Abbot, Ipplepen and Torbay Deanery festivals.

The main table had Kingsteignton at the top of the league for the first time, their ranking being 1.4 ahead of Eggbuckland in second place. The same two teams also occupied the top two places of the all-comers table. The final 10 places for 2011 in the main table were:

Jereme in Frenchay Hospital

Jereme's recovery from the accident on 9 January 2012 is being followed on the Association's website which also has a link to his Veterinary Practice where it was reported that there had been over 6,000 viewings, just in a 3 day period. There is also provision for people to leave comments on the website. These are being read to Jereme daily. Sally, Robert, Lou and their families greatly appreciate the good wishes being sent.

Following the accident Jereme was immediately airlifted to Frenchay Hospital Bristol which specialises in neurological cases. He was diagnosed with a fractured skull and a bleed at the rear of the brain as well as severe facial injuries. This brain haemorrhage was obviously closely monitored and various procedures and monitors were put in place to reduce pressure and the risks of further complications. Surgery was performed in the early hours of the Tuesday morning to remove the blood clot, reduce brain pressure and assess the damage.

Jereme had been in an induced coma following the operations and the sedative dose was required to help reduce any pressure to the brain. After a week the dose was reduced and there was no increase in pressure in the brain. Jereme's breathing had been assisted in the early stages and this prevented him from talking. After just over a fortnight he was communicating well. Jereme still has a long way to go and still has not been fully assessed. He is unable to support himself without assistance.

There had been a set back though on 4 February. Jereme had the catheter removed and had the urge to get up at night time to go to the toilet without asking for help. Remembering that he had been bed ridden since 9 January, he fell straight out of his bed and his bump was a cartoon-like egg on his forehead. This resulted in a further drain into his head. Since this he was transferred from the intensive care unit to the high dependency unit where they focus on rehabilitation. Jereme has made excellent progress since the accident however small setbacks along the way should be expected.

Some people have asked if they are able to get a card to Jereme. His work is happy for you to send these to the Practice and they will make sure that he gets them as he is visited daily. Jereme's works address is Synergy Farm Health, West Hill Barns, Evershot, DT2 OLD. Tel: 01935 83682.

The full table and all-comers table can be found on my website. Note that this may change if I am given any of the results from the competitions I don't already have results for.

New records set for 2011:

Eggbuckland took part in the most number of competitions last year, setting a new record of 32 events – 5 competitions more than the previous record – of which they won 21, also a new record. Their win percentage of 65.63% was, however, some way below their best of 93.33% which they set in 2004.

Salcombe's 328½ at Stoke Gabriel set a new record for the highest number of faults by a team at a competition, but this event saw lots of high scores and consequently the 1432¾ faults scored meant that the competition became the single event with the highest total fault score. The average of 119.40 faults per team is third on the all-time highest average list behind the 2009 National 8 Bell at Chagford (146.94) and the 2002 Minor Final at Chardstock (142.67).

Other statistics of note:

Four teams were unable to complete their peals successfully, one fewer than the previous year. These were Burrington B at the Minor Final, East Anstey at Frithelstock, Exeter Cathedral at the Devon 8 Bell and Holbeton at South Brent.

By winning the 8 bell final, Kingsteignton have become the first team to win 10 finals in a row on either 6 or 8 bells and have increased their record for most 8 bell final wins to 22. Ian Avery has rung in all of these winning teams and so can be considered the most successful 8 bell ringer; he has also nearly 'circled the tower' in doing so and only needs to ring the treble in a winning team to complete this remarkable achievement!

Meanwhile, in six bell ringing Eggbuckland extended their record to 21 Major Final wins with David Trout the only person to have rung in all of these wins, making him the most successful 6 bell ringer by this measure. His wife, Hilary, and older brother, Roger, are in joint second on this list with 20 wins each.
