Kingsteignton set new record for Devon 8 Bell competition

In 2011 Kingsteignton won the Devon Association 8 Bell competition for the 10th consecutive time, which is a new record. Ian Avery has rung in all of those 10 peals. Kingsteignton also have a new record being the team who have won more times than any other team by winning for the 22nd time in 2011. Their first win was in 1967. The previous record was held by North Tawton who had 21 wins, the first being in 1927. Congratulations to the Kingsteignton team and especially to Bill Avery who was instrumental in training Kingsteignton to be able to set this new record.

Plympton to have a ringing experience

Theft from Churches

Your metal has a scrap value and is attractive to thieves, whether it is lead or copper on the roof or bells. Metal items now have to be marked with Smartwater for any insurance to be paid out and then it is limited under the Ecclesiastical policy. You also have to have the the appropriate signage as it has been shown that this can deter removal. A cashless scrap metal trade would create an audit trail and this may significantly reduce metal theft.

Obituaries

Bill Campion immediate past captain of Broadhempston died suddenly at his home on the 1 November 2010 aged 81. Bill, captain for 12 years before his retirement in 2004 was one of those larger than life characters who had an opinion about most things. He was dealt a severe blow when his wife Ella died suddenly some years ago while completing her regular crossword puzzle, leaving Bill without a soul mate in his remote cottage at Woodland. Attempts to get him to come down to Broadhempston and socialise with his former team mates were resisted by Bill. Instead he preferred regular schedules by telephone with Horace Clements (Stoke Gabriel) and Edward Pidwell (Hallwell), Harry Bardens (Bigbury) and rely on local ringers to call when passing. It was clear from those visits Bill was struggling to look after himself. He remained staunchly independent to the end. The funeral service was held at Woodland, half the congregation comringing friends from across South Devon, from Exminster in the East to Egg Buckland in the West. Woodland having only three bells which are not able to be rung full circle so it was decided to ring a memorial peal at Broadhempston on Monday the 13 November. A continuous peal lasting 81 minutes of 720 unrepeated call changes were rung in his memory. All ringers attending from many local towers took part, no matter their skill level, changing the ringers as the peal progressed every 15 minutes or so. The tenor was 'turned in' with calls at a sedate pace by Graham Pascoe who rang the treble throughout. Following the peal, glasses were raised in the Monks Retreat in honour of Bill who had been a loyal member of the local band of Broadhempston ringers for many years.

Herbert 'Pickles' Pascoe

Former captain of Buckland in the Moor, Herbert 'Pickles' Pascoe passed away peacefully on 21st December at around 10.30pm aged 94. The funeral took place at Buckland in the Moor on Thursday 6th January 2011 at 2pm.

Two method peals have been rung in Pickles' memory, one on 24 December and the other on the day of his funeral. William J Ridgman of Arrington, Herts died 16 January 2011 in Addenbrooke's Hospital, Cambridge. Bill was a vice president of the Devon Guild, having learnt to ring at Newton St Cyres. Bill was elected to the Ancient Society of

College Youths in 1955. Many will remember his as an elder statesman of the Cambridge University Guild, having served as Guild President from 1961 to 1989. Bill's funeral was held at St Paternus, North Petherwyn, Cornwall on Friday 4th February at 2 pm. There is also likely to be a memorial service in Cambridge later this year.

Michael Poole died on Sunday 30 January 2011 out in one of his fields. The funeral took place at 2pm on Friday 11 February at Lapford Church.

Lynda Christine Pope died on the 30 January 2011 after a four month illness bravely born. Her funeral was at North Tawton on the 7 February and over one hundred people who attended, spoke volumes about the regard in which she was held.

The funeral was conducted by The Rev Jeff Harris, a family friend, and the reception was held at the Railway Inn.

After a very varied and interesting career, including a spell as an Air Traffic Controller, Air Hostess, owner of a Hotel in Scotland and Pub in Somerset, Lyn and her husband David with their two girls Georgina and Charlotte moved to Sampford Courtenay.

Originally living at Rose Cottage, Lyn had several secretarial jobs before moving to financial services with an insurance company in Exeter and more recently as an accountant for a Farm Services company near Wembworthy. After just over a year at Sampford Courtenay, Lyn moved to the Old Forge North Tawton where she and the family lived for many years before Lyn and David moved to the new houses at Strawberry Fields. Lyn had had a few lessons in Bell Rope handling when they owned the Shurton Inn at Stogursey and she joined the Sampford Courtenay Ringers very soon after her arrival. Lyn was a very regular Sunday ringer and member of the competition band for some 20 years.

In later years Lyn became a valued member of the North Tawton Sunday band where she also was an epistle reader for services. Lyn nursed her husband David for several years, through his increasingly serious dementia and he is now in a nursing home at Launceston.

Lyn is survived by David and her two daughters. "Georgie" who lives in Kent and and "Charlie" who at the present time lives in North Tawton and is a member of the Sampford Courtenay bell ringers.

Harold Adams' funeral was held at Holy Cross Church, Crediton, on Thursday 3 February at 1.30 p.m. Harold learnt to ring in one of the towers on the edge of Exmoor, before joining the team at Chittlehampton. He had rung at Crediton since the 1960s, however ill health had prevented him from ringing recently.

Robert Shears

Always cheerful, a friend and help to many, and totally dependable – this was Robert. A full church at his funeral on Monday 28 March 2011 was testament to the respect in which he was held and to the many friends he had.

Robert did all of his schooling at Dunsford (he was goalkeeper in the school football team) leaving at the age of 14 to work with his father and elder brother John on the farm at Burnwell. He learnt to ring soon after and was a member of the Dunsford ringers for about 65 years until his failing health forced him to give up in 2009. He was a willing and able member of the team right up until the day he retired from ringing and regularly helped out with ringing at Christow. Robert was also supportive of the Church in a practical manner. He could often be found working in the churchyard with a strimmer and massive broom, 'tidying up' as he called it. Such was his eagerness to keep things neat and tidy that he once made short work of a 'wild garden' that we attempted to grow following a suggestion from the judges of the best kept village competition!

We shall miss his great humour and boundless enthusiasm – always willing to help others. His exploits will be recounted by his many friends, especially in the ringing fraternity, for many years to come. He was truly a great Dunsford 'character'. Walt Tremain who rang at Chawleigh passed away on 3 May 2011. He had been in poor health for some time. A private cremation was held at Barnstaple 4 May 2011.

Morris Wright, Tom & Ralf's brother, passed away on 6 May. The funeral was held at Down St Mary on 16 May 2011.

Henry Pascoe died on 6 June 2011 aged 97. He had previously fallen out of his bed and broke a hip. He had an operation to repair this and returned to his residential home where he died. The funeral was held at Ashburton 2pm on 15 June.

Clifford Weekes, who rang for West Alvington, died on 7 August 2011 at 4:30 am. The funeral took place on 17 August at 2pm at West Charleton.

John was a long time ringer with Buckland-in-the-Moor and also had spells with Ashburton, Widecombe-in-the-Moor, Modbury and Plymstock. John Caunter's funeral was held at Ashburton St Andrews on 13 July at 2pm. Ringing took place with the tenor breaking which was now been repaired.

Betty Aggett

Betty, aged 91 and widow of Perce Aggett who was Captain and tenor ringer at South Tawton, passed away on Tuesday 14 June 11. Betty was supportive and used to do wonderful teas for the judges at the South Tawton competitions and she was still helping to serve teas right up to last year's competition.

Arthur Newton

Arthur Newton of Hughenden, Bucks passed away in Wexham Park Hospital Wednesday 15 June 2011, aged years. Arthur learnt to ring at Chulmleigh. Arthur was one of the oldest and longest serving Members of the Ancient Society of College Youths (ASCY), having been elected to the Society in 1945. His son Robert is also a well-known Member. Sylvia Mortimore passed way, in hospital on 8 December 2010 after suffering a cardiac arrest the day before. Sylvia, a regular ringer at Marldon and Stoke Gabriel, leaves her husband, Norman. The funeral took place on Monday 20 December at Marldon at noon. Despite the heavy snow fall and the icy roads the church was packed. Ringing took place from 11:30 until noon and again after the funeral. As many others were unable to attend due to the weather, a memorial service was held at Marldon Church on Saturday 29 January 2011 at 1pm.

Speeches were given by Michael Webster on behalf of the Stoke Gabriel bell ringers and by Harry Bardens on behalf of the Devon Association of Ringers.

Sylvia an accomplished judge for bell ringing striking competitions also attended the Mid Week Ringers (Ringklies) events. The family eulogy follows and there was also a touching eulogy by Douglas Pulle who had worked closely with Norman and Sylvia.

SYLVIA MORTIMORE (SYLV)

SYLVIA was born in Torquay in 1931 and was the daughter of Thomas and Winifred Keen (a local dairyman), and before Sylvia reached school age, she and her parents moved to farm at East Burne, Bickington.

She didn't start school until the age of 6 because of the distance, as the walk was some two and a half miles each way to Bickington School. She went on to Ingsdon Convent, again walking most of the way, but this time with the aid of a little bus ride. Peter, Sylvia's brother, was born in 1933 and together the family milked cows, reared cattle, pigs and turkeys for Christmas. Sylvia was mainly responsible for the milking side of things. She held fond memories of those days and didn't mind the hard work that went with it. Preferring the outdoor life, she took her tractor test at 16 and stayed at home, working on the farm although her dad wanted her to become a nurse. She loved showing cattle at the local market shows and became involved with the Newton Abbot Young Farmers Club, learning various countryside skills. It is also renowned as a first class dating agency! Here she met Norman, a local farmer. Love blossomed and they later married in 1952 at Bickington Church. Married life began at Norman's family farm in Buckfastleigh and it was there that their daughter Wendy was born. Soon they moved up to Kiln Road, Marldon where they did all sorts of things -Market gardening, sold logs, kept saddleback sows, poultry. Norman also farmed land nearby for his father.

John French, a local man, approached them one day and said he was selling his small milk round. So from 1954 Norman and Sylv delivered milk, eggs and poultry to houses in Marldon and Compton. As the village grew, so did their milk sales. In the beginning it was 8-10 gallons a day and by the end of the 1960's it had reached 90 gallons. Being a daily job, they accumulated many friends around the village over the years. Sylv picked and prepared poultry every week as well as selling poultry at Christmas time. Marldon Tor came up for sale in 1955 (which incidentally was one of their milk customers). Norman and Sylv were successful in the purchase of Marldon Tor which consisted of a timber chalet style bungalow surrounded by larch trees and 12 acres. It had been run as a nudist camp and if extra milk was wanted, someone would listen out and shout down through the trees their order for that day!

In 1956 Mark their son was born. It was a wonderful spot to grow up in and in the 39 years spent living, many projects were tackled. It was real teamwork. Between them

built up the poultry to 1,000 head, building or renovating houses to cater them. Sylv was the one who fed them, picked up and graded the eggs for sale. Boiler fowls were also sold each week. Sylv took in visitors for bed and breakfast for a number of years, while Wendy and Mark were growing up. Many returned year after year for the notorious breakfasts and evening meals, the produce cut fresh from the vegetable garden. Sylv loved her garden and spent hours improving the borders around the bungalow. Painting and decorating was on going both inside and out. She could turn her hand to anything and it pleased her to see the improvements. She was also very good at needlework, making clothes for herself and the children. As Wendy and Mark got older, she helped Norman more on the milk round. She learnt to drive and Norman being a keen bell ringer, would drop him off on a Sunday morning at Marldon Church, carry on delivering milk but be back near the Church to pick him up! She took up knitting, not in a traditional way but by machine. She would turn out jumpers for everyone at Christmas! Extra land was later rented next to their own to enable them to keep cattle - stores to bring on and fatten. Also weaned calves in batches which Sylv fed on the bucket. All this taken in her stride. The milk round stopped in early 1970 and in 1991 they retired to Kingskerswell, where they could maybe take life a little more leisurely - but NO! Bell ringing was very much their number one joint interest. Sylv had learnt to ring and they very much enjoyed the company of friends from their bell ringing circles. Sylv led a very full and active life, right up to the end. Nothing was too much trouble. She loved to follow her family as they grew up and revelled in their achievements. Her grandchildren and great grandchildren were a delight to her. There are no words to describe the heartfelt feelings of her many family and friends right now. All we can say is "our memories will never fade". All the help you given us and all the love you have shown, will never be forgot-

A further Eulogy was given by Mr Douglas Pulle who moved to Marldon in 1967 and was 'volunteered' to help with the milk round so that Sylvia and Norman could enjoy a well-earned holiday. He soon discovered how much loved and trusted they both were. The daily milk round, meant that both Sylvia and Norman were well and truly at the centre of life in Marldon. So many people will have fond memories of Sylvia, least of all for her legendary meals.

Ringkly Ringers have Spring and Autumn Holiday

The Mid Week Ringers known as the Ringklies are so dedicated that the majority of the group went on yet another holiday. John and Linda Staddon organised the five days away from home with the Ringers staying at the Savoy, in Bournemouth in May 2011. The coach company used for this event was Mid Devon Coaches and passengers made use of the parking facilities provided by them. Several passengers were picked up en route and ringing took place travelling along to Bournemouth on the Monday. Ringing local to Bournemouth took place Tuesday to Thursday, and there was ringing on the return journey on the Friday.

The hotel provided breakfast and an evening meal, with a free bar, but only from 7.30pm! The real ale drinkers still found a local pub. To assist with the travel requirements lunch was also arranged on the Monday and Friday.

The Ringklies are off again in October, this time following on the tradition of Arthur and Jean's outings. This event is now called the A & J Trip and now organised by John and Linda Staddon. Auntie celebrates 20th Anniversary of Chagford Bellringers' weekend

It started on Friday 8 May 1992 when 17 ringers left Chagford Square at 8.30am in mini-buses for the Isle of Wight. The instructions were to bring food for the day as there was not enough time for a stop and to keep luggage as light as possible because of lack of space on the bus. So started the first of 20 annual weekends of bellringing organised by Julia and the Chagford Team. Times have changed now leaving at 6:30am in a 50 seater with plenty of knee and luggage space and food stops are scheduled. The tradition is now established for the third weekend in August. Ringing has been in the Cathedrals of Winchester, Worcester, Canterbury, Coventry, Bristol, Lichfield Portsmouth and Llandaff along with St Martin in the Fields, Bath Abbey, Dorchester Abbey and Warwick. Of the original 19 ringers, the following have been on all 20 weekends, Julia and Evan Endacott, Jon Bint, Margaret Peirce and Chris Clayton.

The trip organised for 2011 was in the South Gloucester and Oxfordshire area with ringing at Upton St Leonards, Painswick, Horsley and Tetbury on Friday. Eggbuckland and Friends on a Narrowboat Tour along the Kennet & Avon Canal 20 - 27 May 2011

Back in the autumn of 2010 I received an invitation to go on a ringing trip with a difference and readily accepted. I had considered on several occasions in recent years that it would be fun to hire a narrow boat and tour a region's churches to ring bells. The area would include parts of Wiltshire, Somerset, Avon and Gloucestershire. It goes without saying that a sample of ales in the local hostelries was firmly on the agenda too!

Friday 20th May 2011 soon dawned and we convened at Seend. There were 12 of us in the party – 9 of us were ringers. It soon became evident that our organisers Dave and Hilary Trout had put in many hours of preparation. There were 6 members of the Trout Family – these were Dave and Hilary, Nick and Angie, Dan and Steven. Sue, Louise and I were the other three. The non ringers were Tim and Leslie from Welwyn and Hayley Trout. Seend are a ground floor ring of six with a 14 ½ cwt tenor. They went their weight and we had soon accomplished some decent striking on our first tower. From the churchyard there was a splendid view of the Salisbury Plain. After some liquid refreshment we headed to Hilperton Marina, just north of Trowbridge to park up and board our mobile base for the next week.

Our 12 berth narrow boat bore the name of 'Whistling Swan'. The kitchen was centrally placed with a bathroom and room for sleeping six persons on either side of this. The obligatory health and safety lecture was not too arduous and an engineer showed us the basics about running the boat. Then it was over to our Skipper Dave to get the machine moving. We headed in a westerly direction along the Kennet and Avon Canal towards Bristol. Recommended maximum speed was four knots - this was fine as it gave us more time to enjoy the views, local hospitality, each other's company; and of course the bells. After successfully passing over an aqueduct and through our first lock we parked up no sorry moored our vessel in Bradford-on-Avon: just next to the Canal Tavern. We then walked up the hill to our first peal of eight at Christchurch tenor weighing just over 12 cwt. These went well with most of our ringers enjoying the experience! We then needed refreshment in the Canal Tavern - with a few exotic dishes on the menu to include Kangaroo and Crocodile! Then we staggered (not really?) back to the boat and turned in for the night.

Saturday morning soon dawned. Thanks to the ladies, a full English was served up for us. We were then on our way again and soon moored up at Limpley

Stoke. An enjoyable 30 minute walk brought us to our next tower - Freshford. Relatively recently overhauled this 11½ cwt six went well. We popped into the Hop Pole Inn for a quick lunch before returning to the Whistling Swan. On we travelled to Claverton and found the church after a short stroll up the hill. This pretty little set of six weighing 6½ cwt were enjoyable. Interesting ringing positions - in a line rather than a ring similar to Otterton. Well satisfied we wandered back to the canal and moved on to Bathampton, where we moored, rang, fed and watered in the George Inn. A word of warning if you visit this little six you need a short 4th ringer poor positioning adjacent to the clock box! Red paint on the woodwork to warn ringers of hand/knuckle damage!! Pity these could have gone better.

Sunday morning was then upon us and off the short distance to Bath mooring just before a line of 6 locks! Off we headed to a pretty little light six at Lansdown to ring for service - 2 % cwt tenor - a challenge but well handled by all. Then a quick coffee courtesy of Morrison's and we walked onto Larkhall - a good ring of eight weighing approx 11 cwt. These were a bit noisy but went well. We then had opportunity to visit more of Bath - some were tired and took a taxi! Afternoon arrived and we set sail for the lock-marathon, a run of six, the team performed well under strictest control of Captain Dave. The final tower of the day was at Twerton, a ground floor ring of eight weighing 13 cwt. These were tricky to rise but we soon got hold of them. We rounded the evening off in the Dolphin Inn where several of the younger members practised their Pool skills (with a cue you understand). Food here was very wholesome and of extremely good value for money.

The first ring on Monday was reached after crossing a dairy farm to the village of Kelston. A ground floor ring which sounded good outside but were a bit 'agricultural' as we had to clear the belfry of debris and they were difficult to rise. Back to the boat we went, avoiding silage trailers and soon on our way to the Bird in Hand for a liquid snack. On we headed westwards to Keynsham the first drizzle of the trip did not dampen our spirits. This was a lovely ring of eight, 25cwt. Well done to Steve who put the tenor up. We managed a peal of Titums too (thank you Hils for bearing this). We rounded the evening off in the Lock Keeper, to be recommended, the portions were getting bigger and bigger or was it our appetites? A fine day on Tuesday dawned; we turned around and headed back upstream to Bitton. What a welcome we had! We were also greeted by Patrick from South Brent (working he said, on route to Wales). This is where Emma from S Brent used to ring, then called Emma Richards, a team picture dated silver jubilee in 1977 included Emma in the tower gallery! An excellent ring of eight weighing 14cwt. A welcome coffee break was enjoyed in the walled garden next to the church. After dinner we moored further upstream and walked up to Newton St Loe. Ground floor six, not very musical but went well once we were up. Poor Louise had a pulled shoulder and was forced to rest. She managed a peal at the next tower, Corston, light eight with short draft. Then on to Weston for our evening meal.

First tower on Wednesday was Weston, ground floor ring of eight with 12cwt tenor. Not the easiest but a valiant effort by all. After lunch we rang at Bathwick, a fine 19cwt 10, but only enough to do back eight some justice, and in my opinion we did with some excellent striking. Finally after a long walk (some of us strolled this route on Saturday eve looking for a watering hole – lead by Dave!) to Bathford we reached our last tower of the day, an interesting six of 8 cwt. On we went to Limpley Stoke and had a good evening meal in the Hop Pole Inn.

Thursday we woke up to rain. Once wrapped up we walked to Westwood, a good 4½ cwt six. Almost a lock out! A good peal was disturbed by yours truly doing a terrier impression, 'manflu' coughing you understand! The rain eased and we soon got to Bradford for the second time. We then rang at the other tower in the town, Holy Trinity, these were proper, 30 cwt of metal and went well! We then travelled back to Hilperton and moored (boat due back in Marina at 0930 Friday). We rang at Hilperton and dined at the Lion and Fiddle. Friday arrived too quickly and we unloaded our belongings and said goodbye to the Whistling Swan. Sadly our final ring of the trip at Holt was a lock out!

On behalf of the crew I extend a very big thank you to Dave and Hils for organising a brilliant week. Thanks to the rest of the crew for doing your bit too, it made it all run smoothly, the breakfast team, the lock team, and of course our Skipper, Captain Dave, for ensuring in Hayley's words that a 'Titanic' impression did not occur. I can thoroughly recommend this type of ringing tour especially if you want to go at a relaxed pace, enjoy good company, like a bit of walking and hate spending too many hours on the road! It was certainly fun and a new experience for all!

A REPORT OF THE 1972 CENTRAL COUNCIL OF RINGERS SPRING BANK HOLIDAY MEETING IN LONDON

(Taken from The Ringing World, June 16th, 1972, page 492) Articles found by Scott Adams.

The arrangements and organisation for the Central Council of Church Bell-Ringers Annual Meeting for 1972 were undertaken by the Ancient Society of College Youths and the Society of Royal Cumberland Youths. A committee was made up of an equal number of members from each working together under the chairmanship of Air Commodore J. S. Mason. Mr D. E. Sibson was the secretary and he was ably supported by the masters of both societies (Mr. A. R. Patterson, College Youths, and Mr. Dennis Beresford (Cumberlands).

Mr. Beresford said it was his privilege, as master, to welcome the Council to London after 24 years, particularly as his society was celebrating its 225th anniversary. The chief feature of the organisation had been co-operation, and the committee were deeply grateful to the other London societies for their agreement that the two societies could be hosts to the Council. The Devon Association members present called forth particular mention, for many had started off from home before 2 a.m. that morning and were returning that night, having taken part in the call change competition during the afternoon. (Applause). The Devon Association of Ringers in sending six teams (by invitation) to London to take part in a competition of call change ringing at St. Vedast's, Foster Lane, during Monday afternoon, was a most successful innovation and has done much to bring together both call change and scientific ringers into closer relationship within the Exercise - which is of Church Bell Ringing.

It was a happy thought on the part of Mr. Dennis Beresford (master, Cumberland Youths) to suggest that an invitation be extended to the Devon Association, which is affiliated to the Central Council, to send some teams to London during the meeting of the Council over the Spring Bank Holiday to take part in a call change competition. When the Devon Association accepted the invitation it was received with great pleasure, tremendous interest being shown by all concerned, as well as by Council members generally. St. Vedast's, Foster Lane (6 bells), was chosen for the competition, and the teams taking part were the three champions last year from North Devon and three from South Devon. The cold wind, however, certainly dispersed some of the groups of scientific ringers to stand in shop doorways or the church precincts, but as team followed team the prospects of which would be the winner became more obscure. After the last peal there was general discussion among the competing teams and, with few exceptions, the competitors seemed disappointed, saying that they had not rung as well as they should. They felt they had not achieved the good rhythm and striking which is always expected from the West Country teams. In fact the standard, in our opinion, was excellent. Taking into account the long, tiring journey and the strangeness of the surroundings, apart from the fact that it did impress the method ringers, the results were very creditable and all who listened could not but be satisfied with the performances.

At the reception in the Great Hall of St. Bartholomew's Hospital the results were given and the certificates presented. The judges also received commemorative certificates of the occasion, and the chairman of the Devon thanks to the two associations and to the Central Council for the invitation to London to participate in the competition. It was, he said, a very special occasion and his association and the six representative bands attending had felt it a great honour to be present that day. (Applause).



Paul also has a call change record in that on 30th September 2000 there were 5040 changes completed in 5hr 33min at Buckland in the Moor, with just Paul conducting, with most changes being called at EVERY handstroke.

Thomas J Waterson

On 26th February 2011 Thomas became the youngest person (aged 19yr 8mth) to ring a peal on the tenor at Exeter Cathedral (72cwt) and at St Buryan, Cornwal (37cwt), the heaviest 6 bell tower in the world, the youngest to ring a peal of Surprise Minor in 3hrs 33minutes on 13th February 2011.

Alison Waterson and Hilary Beresford

Thomas' mother and aunt also have records for feats of learning and method complexity at a young age in that Alison Waterson on 3 September 1976, then aged 15 rang the 2nd to Yorkshire Maximus and Hilary Beresford, then aged 16 rang the 4th that day.

PERCY PESTER soon to be 81

Percy reached the age of 80 on the 15th November 2010. He was born and brought up at Dunsford where he learnt to ring, an activity which he started in 1946. He then went on to ring at Dunsford for 20 years, mainly ringing the tenor. He first competed in a ringing competition on Saturday 22nd September 1956, ringing the tenor for Dunsford in the 'B' section at the 15th Kenn Deanery Festival which was held at Ashton (known to Percy though as Ashun!). That team comprised of: Treble, Alf. Sercombe. 2nd Tony James. 3rd Maurice Sharland. 4th Dick Sharland. 5th Robert Shears. Tenor, Percy Pester. No reflection on Percy but this was the last time in which Ashton's bells were used in a Deanery competition. The bells have remained silent ever since. In 1964 he moved with his family to Colaton Raleigh where he lived for just over 40 years. There he joined the ringers and in 1970 was appointed Tower Captain, a position he still holds. Throughout his ringing career he has encouraged and taught many people to ring, including his son David. Thanks to Percy's efforts Colaton Raleigh currently has 10 ringers and the bells are rung on a regular basis. He has consistently "flown the flag" for the Devon Association of Ringers in and around East Devon and acted as a faithful and reliable ringing judge for over 20 years. In 2005 he moved with his wife Sheila to No 1, Poplar Row, Budleigh Salterton (or as Percy would say -to 'Salterton').

It was in the Salterton Arms that I caught up with him following his 80th birthday and listened to his slant on the current situation surrounding bells and ringers. From his perspective things aren't altogether good with, "too much borrowing going on inside competitions" and seemingly the quality of striking has deteriorated over the years. Also today "there's they that c'n ring (presumably the minority) and they that thinks they c'n ring" (presumably the rest of us) and 'the trouble is, the more they listen the less they yur'! We didn't talk just about bellringing however. I was also treated to a well informed account, supported with photocopied text, on the workings of the old Teign Valley line and how quarrying operated in the area right up until the 1960's. It was a brief glimpse into the quarrying and mining industry of the upper Teign valley and the task involved in both extracting and transporting the valley's resources down to the old Christow station that was. In the Barytes mine at Bridford the late Reuben Elliot, captain of Bridford ringers, was employed as a blacksmith. Percy produced a photograph taken in 1950 of the mine workers. Included in the group of sixty or so men were the Waldron brothers Jack and Bert. Who both rang at Bridford as well as Reuben, and a non ringer, Percy's father, Harry Pester. Situated at Bridford was the Scatter rock stone quarry. The stone from Scatter rock was reputed to be the hardest of all road stone.

We spent an entertaining time together. It was good to hear an unrestrained Devonian accent being spoken in a traditional Devon pub and looking around I wasn't the only one enjoying our conversation! Belated Happy Birthday to you Percy from us all. *Colin Adams*.

Bill Blake celebrates his 90th birthday

Bill has recently celebrated his 90th birthday. He was born February 2nd,1921, in Diptford and moved to Stoke Canon in 1988. He did well at school, often being top of his class. Bill left school at 14 and joined his father's business as a carpenter, builder, decorator and sawyer. He ioined the RAF Regiment in 1939 and as part of the B.E.F. (British Expeditionary Force) worked on restoring and maintaining airfields in Europe as the German army retreated. He also worked on clearing the beaches at Ostend of remaining mines After the war in Europe he found himself being transferred to Okinawa, but as his troop ship passed Gibraltar, the news of the surrender of Japan came through and Bill found himself being diverted to Singapore and Hong Kong. On demob Bill returned to England on the 'Mauritania', the old liner that had been commandeered as a troopship.

When his father died he carried on the business of A. Blake and Son. He has fond memories of his working life, particularly working with his father on all the woodwork required for the Totnes bypass and on one occasion purchasing from another company the magnificent oak screen with lead light glazing that had originally been in the Quirke family's mansion. Bill adapted it for Diptford Parish Church to act as a partition between the main church and the bell ringing area. He remembers too, how very well local small builders would work together on larger enterprises. Bill's great love is bell ringing. He was captain of the Diptford bell ringers for thirty years and is a member of the 'Retired Bell Ringers Club' that draws its members from all over Devon and some from Cornwall. He has rung in many churches including of course Stoke Canon and Rewe. To celebrate his recent birthday, a surprise was arranged for him in Rewe Parish Church when fifty bell ringers greeted his arrival with a hearty rendering of 'Happy Birthday' followed by ringing. Lunch at the 'Ruffwell' with further ringing at Thorverton.

A lover of music, Bill has sung in choirs and until his fingers became too stiff he played the mandolin and violin. His favourite music is Handel's 'Messiah' He enjoys reading particularly books on travel, Michael Palin being a favourite author. Travel has been a joy to him especially visits to Malta and Italy, where Lake Como, Lake Garda and Capri were favourite destinations. His most treasured possession is his gate leg table made by his father from Devon oak and chestnut. When asked whom he most admired and would like to invite to tea he replied. "Prince Charles and Camilla Duchess of Cornwall together with the ex. Vicar of Diptford, Peter Willis and his wife Monica, although there could be many more but I wouldn't have the room!"

Asked what lesson his long life had taught him he said "Respect for the elderly. It is so important, they have so much to offer. Everyone should learn from them."

Sadly Bill's wife died in 2002. He is a father, grandfather and great grandfather. He has two daughters and a son. Rosemarie is a nurse. Pauline a teacher and Ian a computer consultant. Bill is very happy in Stoke Canon. When he first arrived in the village he met Brian the Post Master who gave him such a warm welcome. He used to call regularly on Ron and Jean Grimwood for the key to Rewe Church. Living on the first floor they would call down "Who is it?" He would call up "It's Bill." Ron would shout down,"We know at least six Bills." "I want to open up for the bell ringers" said Bill. "Next time," said Ron, "shout up, I'm Bill the Bells' and we will know who you are!" From then on Bill became known as 'Bill the Bells'!

Bill's verdict on Stoke Canon- "Stoke Canon has been absolutely spot on for everything".

Mischa Thompson - Denmisch Ring

A Devon garage has become the unlikely setting for preserving one of the country's most traditional pastimes. A detached house in Okehampton is giving young people some hands on experience of bell ringing, thanks to computers which provide the sounds. Mischa Thompson installed the simulated bells to allow local ringers to practice at any time. The light weight of the system compared with traditional bells is encouraging young people to take part.

Ten ropes are connected to 10 bell wheels in the loft of Mischa's garage. The wheels are in turn hooked up to a computer and loudspeakers. Mischa said: "You can't ring church bells all the time, you have to get permission. But here you can ring any time." One youngster who has joined the bell-ringing group, called the Denmisch Ring, said: "It's strange being in a garage, but it's very exciting."

BBC Spotlight had a feature on the 10 simulated bells located in the garage with filming taking place on Sunday 24 July from 2.30pm onwards. Mischa advertised for as many ringers as possible to attend for some method and call change ringing. Mischa was particularly looking for some young ringers to show that ringing is for everyone.

Mischa states that it all went very well and wishes to thank all the ringers that came to support the event especially the youngsters. Mischa collected £105 from the donations for the refreshments which she sent to the Devon Air Ambulance towards their new helicopter. Mischa states that the person who designed and installed them has them on loan to her or until she is able to buy them!

Maintenance is annual and the extra 2 bells was to make the ring different.

Old ringing records needed - can you help?

As I'm sure most of you already know, I run a website where I keep an archive of results from competitions held since 2003, along with a league table for each year so that we have some sort of indication who is the 'best' team in a given year. A couple of years ago I upgraded how I run the site, from pencil-paper-and-perspiration to an online database, to make things easier to update. As a consequence I can make the archive better and give people more information, and so I've got a new project in mind which I need your help in completing.

We all know that method ringers keep records of all the peals and quarter-peals they ring complete with a list of who rang which bell etc. We don't currently have anything like this, and I think it's about we did. With this in mind, I'd like to compile a list of the ringers who were in the winning teams of the following competitions since the first year the respective competitions were held:

- · 8 bell Final
- · 6 bell Major Final
- · 6 bell Minor Final
- · 6 bell qualifiers, North and South

With the possible later additions of the South Devon 8 bell competition, the South Devon Interdeanery competition and the north Devon equivalents, if such competitions exist.

Once the data is collected I hope to be able to make it both browsable and searchable, so you, or anyone else, will be able to find out, for example, who was in the team that won the 1937 6 bell final or how many times a given ringer has won the North Devon qualifier.

Along with this I'd like to back-date the archive of results for all competitions that I have, so that there is a place where we can answer all those niggling questions that we all occasionally have, such as "When was the Swimbridge Major Final?" or "Where was the 1978 8 bell Final held?". Many of you do keep records, I hope that you will be able to assist me.

I believe that now is the time to do this, as if we leave it too much longer a lot of this knowledge will be gone! If you can help by providing the names of the ringers or results from past competitions please do not hesitate to email me (at james@myconid.co.uk), send the information by post, or even come and talk to me.

700 years at Plympton St Mary's

The 7 hour ringing marathon at St Mary's Plympton has been devised by using the dates 1311 and 2011 (the 700 years) and adding the dates together to make 3322 changes. If 14 teams wish to take part, ringing will be for 25 minutes for each tower with 5 minutes for a change over. If more than 14 towers show an interest, the ringing times per tower will be less. This occasion is in the early stages of planning and until they know the level of responses in the coming months, no final details can be confirmed. This 8 bell tower has a tenor of 25-1-11.

A certificate will be presented to each team member and a team certificate also given for their church. A plaque with all the names, teams, and their respective churches will be produced and to be kept in St Mary's Tower. A peal will be devised for this occasion, and each team will ring the same peal with a conductor being provided, if required.

St Margaret's Church, Stoodleigh 26th June 2011 - Rededication of the bells

The "Big Society" is promoted as a new initiative but, in fact, there is nothing new about it at all; such has existed in various guises since man first evolved into a social animal. Similarly, bells have played a fundamental role in the culture of all societies succeeding the bronze age. Thus the good citizens of Stoodleigh were following a centuries-trod path when they demonstrated a practical manifestation of what man always has managed without the need for attendant political whimsy.

Having had the bells at St Margaret's pronounced "unringable" in mid-2008, the small Stoodleigh community set about raising what for them was the enormous sum required to refurbish the ring of six and at the same time, restore some of the church's medieval decorations. It is to the great credit of those involved in this undertaking and with gratitude to the many who donated to this effort - individuals, the Heritage Lottery Fund and others - that in February of this year, the work was completed and the bells were again able to ring out. These adventures have been chronicled in earlier editions of RRD by Jennifer Rowlandson. Culmination of this stalwart enterprise was Sunday, 26 June's Service of Thanksgiving and Rededification of the bells by the Bishop of Crediton, the Right Reverend Robert Evens. During Evensong, augmented by a choir made up of local singers, Bishop Bob commanded the switching on of the new church interior lights. These are of a pleasant and entirely complimentary style and for which he provided a thanksgiving. Following one of his characteristically humorous and always relevant addresses, the Bishop presented Jennifer Rowlandson with the two volumes of the "Towers and Bells of Devon", that extraordinarily comprehensive work by Messrs Scott, Mack and Clarke. This gift was made in recognition of the pivotal part played by Jennifer – it has been around her that the success of the undertaking has hinged. Subsequently, the Bishop, Vicar, Chuchwardens and Bell Ringers moved to the west end of the nave for the Rededification of the Bells. This was the cue for the resident band under Gerald Palfrey to catch hold and start the festivities.

Nearly all the ringers who attended the service then took a turn – at one time, the Presidents of both the Guild and the Association together with the Chairman of the NE Branch could be seen in deep tintinabular concentration. It was a joyous occasion and a fun evening celebrating the outcome of such a worthwhile enterprise.

I had been invited to ring at Stoodleigh not long after the bells had been recommissioned and thought at the time that they possessed a very distinctive brightness and clarity.

Later, these qualities were confirmed from outside when the bells were rung for the service. It is an interesting ring with the combination of light weight (the tenor being a few ounces over 7cwt) and longish draft making for some lively ropes. Gerald Palfrey is the Tower Captain on 01398 351271.

Jennifer Rowlandson reports that the service was a great success and she was completely overwhelmed by the presentation. She states that the church looked fantastic as the flower ladies had pulled out all the stops - it was rather like a flower festival. Jennifer also managed to gather together a choir of 22 so it was a superb Choral Evensong.

Stoodleigh

The peal of six bells at St Margaret, Stoodleigh were removed from the tower in September 2010 after a period of 2 years of silence. The bells were deemed unringable after an inspection found that water was coming in from the tower roof and this had badly affected the 1867 oak frame by Warner of London. The bells were subsequently removed, a new frame constructed and the bells have newly crafted wheels and hung on new bearings. The six bells are a complete peal cast in 1867 by John Warner & Son of Cripplegate, London. Nicholson Engineering under took the project. The weights are: Treble: 3-1-23, 2nd: 3-3-15, 3rd: 4-1-12, 4th: 4-2-7, 5th 5-2-24 and Tenor: 7-0-3.

High Bray

The six bells at All Saints church, High Bray were unringable due to part of the oak frame decaying. The bells have been silent for some 30 years. The job of restoring the bells and the frame was awarded to John Taylor & Co of Loughborough. The Stokes frame which dates from 1892 is in fairly good condition. Taylors constructed a new side where the decay was and strengthened the rest. The frame now back in position sits on a new RSJ support beam. The bells have been re-hung with new fittings.

The bells weights are as follows: Treble: 4-1-9, 2nd: 4-2-4, 3rd: 4-2-19, 4th: 6-1-24, 5th: 8-3-2 and Tenor: 11-3-26 in Ab.

Sheepstor

The restoration of the bells at St Leonards Church, Sheepstor is now complete and they were re-hung in the original Stokes frame in January. The restoration has been a great success. The bells were retuned at Whitechapel as part of the restoration and the bells were re-hung with new fittings. The weights of the newly tuned peal are as follows: Treble: 4-0-24,2nd: 3-3-21, 3rd: 4-0-0, 4th: 4-1-9, 5th: 4-3-24 and Tenor: 6-2-19 in A

Devon Association Training, Recruitment & Youth Development

The three topics mentioned above were widely discussed with lots of good ideas coming to the fore, with the following highlights:

- The committee are proposing to put together a list of area recruitment contacts which would be available to contact and advise prospective recruits (e.g. those expressing an interest at the Devon County Show) of local towers and appropriate regional training events.
- We are looking for ideas for suitable young ringers events across the county.

We will be holding regular meetings throughout the year and will report back at regular intervals, so watch this space! In addition to this, we are very keen to hear from you all – do you have a specific training need for your local area or have any suggestions regarding recruitment? We would love you to get involved. Ringing for the future

On Saturday 12 November 2011 there will be a national conference entitled "Change Ringing for the Future", initiated by the Central Council Education Committee. The conference will be a unique opportunity to discuss the well known problems of recruitment and training and to hear innovative ideas, perhaps from local Associations. It is a chance to bring experiences for the benefit of others. Both the Council and its affiliated societies have put significant efforts into improving the training of ringers, but yet it would seem that in many towers the training is inadequate for developing recruits to their full potential. A recent initiative that will improve this situation is the establishment of ringing centres. It is too early to assess the impact of this initiative, but in an environment in which the expectations of students is higher than ever (particularly now that a greater proportion are older people) setting up centres where the very best training is available is likely to be highly beneficial.
